


# The Charity Principle

# How We Argue: The Charity Principle

- Notice when a statement requires charitable interpretation (controversial, vague, or overstated)
- Interpret statements in the way that makes the most sense in context, and is most likely to be true
  - Don't commit authors to unnecessarily bold or controversial claims
  - Choose a more modest interpretation

#### How We Argue: Intellectual Charity

- Humility: Some of the things I believe could be (probably are) wrong, and other people know valuable things that I do not.
- **Truth-seeking**: (All else being equal) It is helpful to have my mistaken beliefs corrected.
- Open-mindedness: Other people's arguments against my beliefs are one way I can find out that some of my beliefs are mistaken and correct them. Even when they do not show I am mistaken, those arguments can give me insights I lack.
