

## WHAT IS THIS MODULE?

In this module, we'll examine the artworks of five Wabanaki artists, Gina Brooks, Wolastiqiyik (Maliseet) painter and illustrator; Jeremy Frey, Peskotomuhkati (Passamaquoddy) basketmaker; Tim Shay, Panawahpskek (Penobscot) sculptor; Alan Syliboy, Mi'kmaq painter and animator, and Mali Obamsawin, Abenaki musician. These five artists draw on traditions and imagery from Wabanaki culture to create their art. After getting to know the five artists and their artworks, you will branch out to discover more hidden talents in the Wabanaki art world and bring awareness to this beautiful, powerful art.

Improving the quality of and access to Wabanaki studies benefits all students. For non Indigenous students, it can lead to greater awareness and compassion.
