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Early, effective CPR and the use of AED's have been shown to increase survival from out of hospital cardiac arrest. The Maine EMS 2013 Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest (OHCA) Quality Improvement Study reveals the need for increased bystander CPR and AED use in Maine patients suffering cardiac arrest. The goal of this Public Health Initiative Outreach program is to provide resources to EMS leaders in an effort to increase bystander CPR and AED use in OHCA patients. Provided below are web-links and suggestions for resources that can assist EMS leaders in promoting these critical, layperson services in any community.

The OHCA study completed earlier this year is attached. Major lessons learned from this project include the value and importance of the public's involvement in the care of cardiac arrest patients. The following resources are intended to promote CPR and early AED use in Maine communities.

Outreach Ideas:

If your service is able to utilize local public broadcasting station; a public service announcement and training announcements for Hands-Only CPR may reach an age group that has traditionally been difficult to reach (47-67 years). Alternate strategies for addressing this age group include focused CPR training of their children or grandchildren. Reaching out and coordinating with Primary Care Physicians to teach their high-risk patient's family Hands-Only CPR and the signs/ symptoms of cardiac events might also have a positive impact on our citizens. Currently, Maine Medical Center and Central Maine Medical Center offers Hands-Only CPR classes through their survivors outreach program.

Pulse point was released in June 2014 and has received good reviews. It can:

1.) Give you the location of the nearest AED

2.) Activate Bystander response for CPR (only done with the help of a dispatch center participating in the program).

3.) Allow you to update AED locations or enter a new AED location.

4.) Increase a service's situational awareness; with a Pulse-point enabled agency units can view incidents in real time, units assigned and enhance interoperability with neighboring services.
