Subject: Guidance on 24-Hour Reporting Period and Reporting Debts & Obligations

PLEASE READ THIS EMAIL THOROUGHLY!

As a reminder, the 24-Hour Reporting Period begins <u>Wednesday</u>. <u>October 26 and ends on Monday</u>. <u>November 7</u>. During the 24-Hour Reporting Period, any transactions in the following list <u>must</u> be reported within 24 hours on the Commission's eFiling website:

- ➤ Any single contribution of \$1,000 or more
- > Any single loan of \$1,000 or more
- > Any single expenditure of \$1,000 or more
- Any single unpaid debt or unpaid order of \$1,000 or more
 - This is regardless of whether you have an invoice or have made a payment on a purchase. If you agree to <u>or</u> place an order with a vendor that is, or may be, \$1,000 or more, you are required to report it as a debt on a 24-Hour Report during the 24-Hour Reporting Period

To file a 24-Hour Report, you must log on to the eFiling website and enter the transaction. The system will make a special 24-Hour Report for you to file. The report must then be completely filed - just entering the transaction will not meet the filing requirements.

This email also serves as a reminder about the importance of reporting debts and unpaid obligations. <u>Debts</u> must be reported when a reporting period ends, and you have placed an order during that reporting period that you have not fully paid for yet. Regardless of whether you have received an invoice or bill; you are responsible for at least having an estimate of how much your order(s) will cost; reporting an estimated amount in a debt is allowed.

For instance, candidate Bridget Jones agrees to a third direct mail purchase with the direct mail vendor on October 14th. Bridget needs to file the 11-Day Pre-General Report on October 28th but doesn't have an invoice yet. However, the last two direct mail pieces cost around \$1,500 each, so Bridget reports a debt of \$1,500 with a date of October 14 in the 11-Day Pre-General Report.

EVERY ORDER PLACED OR AGREED TO BY OCTOBER 25TH MUST BE INCLUDED ON THE 11-DAY PRE-GENERAL REPORT.

HOW TO FILE REPORTS

Using the Commission's Website. Candidates who receive or expect to receive at least \$1,500 for their campaigns must file reports electronically on the Commission's website. Candidates or treasurers must enter the required information and the treasurer must click "File Report" by 11:59 p.m. on the filing deadline. Candidates who lack access to the technology or the technological ability to file reports on the internet may request a waiver by April 15, 2022. The Commission will grant all reasonable requests.

Commission staff will be available until 5:00 p.m. on filing deadlines to offer assistance to candidates and campaign staff.

REPORTING PERIODS

Each campaign finance report covers a specific period of time. Campaigns must report all contributions received and expenditures made during the period, <u>as well as all debts and obligations that remain unpaid at the end of a period</u>.

If any transactions were not included in a report that has already been filed, the candidate or treasurer must amend the previously filed report. When completing or amending reports, candidates and their treasurers are encouraged to call the Commission staff with any questions.

REQUIRED REPORTS

Semiannual Reports for Candidates with Financial Activity in 2021. If a candidate raises or spends more than \$500 before December 31, 2021, the campaign must file a 2022 January Semiannual Report no later than January 18, 2022, covering all financial activity since registration.

Required Pre- and Post-Election Reports for All Candidates. Candidates are required to file campaign finance reports according to the schedule found in the table on this page. Each report covers a specific time period and must include all activity within that period.

24-Hour Reports. The 24-hour reporting requirement applies during the 13-day period prior to an election

How to File 24-Hour Reports:

• File reports electronically; eFiling will create a 24-Hour Report to file after the transaction is added.

WHEN TO FILE 24-HOUR REPORTS:

- Within 24 hours of the contribution, expenditure, or debt or obligation.
- A report must be filed on a weekend or holiday if that is when it is due.
- Qualifying transactions taking place on the day before an election must be reported on election day.

(calendar above). A 24-Hour Report must be filed within 24 hours when a candidate:

- receives a single contribution or loan of \$1,000 or more; or
- makes a single expenditure or incurs an unpaid debt or obligation of \$1,000 or more.

If a candidate incurs a <u>debt or obligation</u> with a vendor during the 24-hour reporting period, they must report the debt or obligation within 24 hours, <u>regardless of when the vendor is paid</u>. The table to the right lists actions which constitute incurring a debt or obligation. Overhead costs, such as rent, taxes, utilities, and

some salary payments, are exempt from 24-hour reporting. A debt payment of \$1,000 or more must be reported in the 24-hour reporting period, unless the debt itself was reported in the report immediately

UNPAID DEBTS AND OBLIGATIONS WHICH ARE REPORTABLE IN 24-HOUR REPORTS

The placement of an order for goods and services

A promise or agreement (even an implied one) that payment will be made

The signing of a contract for a good or service

The delivery of a good or service even if payment has not been made



MAKING & REPORTING EXPENDITURES

Candidates must spend their MCEA funds for campaign-related purposes and not for other purposes, such as the candidate's personal benefit, party-building, or to promote another candidate's campaign. MCEA candidates should be aware of the Expenditure Guidelines (included in this folder), and that some types of expenditures have special record keeping and reporting requirements. MCEA candidates should take into account the public nature of the funds, the underlying objectives of the MCEA, and the reasonableness of the expenditures under the circumstances.



MAKING

- All expenditures must be made with campaign funds and must be allowable under the Expenditure Guidelines; only campaign purchases may be made with campaign funds.
- All expenditures should be made from the campaign bank account by check or debit card, and reimbursements to the candidate or volunteers should be avoided. Expenditures over \$50 may never be paid for with cash.
- Expenditures to pay campaign staff or consultants must have a contemporaneous contract or invoice or timesheet (please see your 2022 Candidate Guidebook or contact your Candidate Registrar for more information).
- All campaign literature, advertising, and promotional items, other than small or handmade items, must have a proper disclosure statement on it—the most simple version is: "Authorized and Paid For by the Candidate"
- Candidates are allowed to reimburse themselves and others for campaign travel using the \$0.45/mile rate, but contemporaneous travel logs must be kept to do so; candidates should not purchase fuel outright with MCEA funds, as the mileage rate includes the cost of fuel.

ETH - 5

- Every expenditure and debt, regardless of amount, must be itemized in campaign finance reports.
- If a campaign places an order or purchase, or enters into an agreement for services, it has **incurred a debt.** If a campaign has any unpaid or outstanding debts at the end of a reporting period, **those debts must be disclosed in that report.** Debts must be reported even if no payment has been made and no goods or services have been received.
- For each expenditure the campaign must: report the date and amount, and the
 full name and address of the payee; choose an expenditure type; and include
 a brief description of what was purchased. Campaigns will be asked to amend
 their reports if any of this information is missing, inaccurate, or incomplete.
- When choosing an expenditure type, candidates should do their best to make sure they are selecting an appropriate option. Incorrect expenditure types are the most common reason campaigns need to amend reports.
- When reporting a reimbursement, the vendor of the goods or services should be reported as the payee, not the person who was reimbursed, and the date should be the date of the original purchase, not the date the reimbursement was made. In the description area, the campaign should include the information of who was reimbursed and on what date.
- When reporting a mileage reimbursement expenditure, the payee should be the individual who is receiving the reimbursement; the campaign should include in the description the number of miles traveled and the dates of travel for the amount being reimbursed.
- In the 13 days before an election, most expenditures, debts, and debt payments of \$1,000 or more have to be reported in a special 24-Hour Report.

Title 21-A M.R.S.

Chapter 13: Campaign Finance Reports and Finances

. . .

Subchapter II Reports on Campaigns for Office

. . .

§ 1012. Definitions

As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

. . .

3. Expenditure. The term "expenditure:"

A. Includes:

- (1) A purchase, payment, distribution, loan, advance, deposit or gift of money or anything of value made for the purpose of influencing the nomination or election of any person to state, county or municipal office, except that a loan of money to a candidate by a financial institution in this State made in accordance with applicable banking laws and regulations and in the ordinary course of business is not included;
- (2) A contract, promise or agreement, expressed or implied, whether or not legally enforceable, to make any expenditure;
- (3) The transfer of funds by a candidate or a political committee to another candidate or political committee; and
- (4) A payment or promise of payment to a person contracted with for the purpose of influencing any campaign as defined in section 1052, subsection 1; and

. . .

3-A. Other candidates. A treasurer of a candidate for state or county office other than the office of Governor shall file reports with the commission and municipal candidates shall file reports with the municipal clerk as follows. Once the first required report has been filed, each subsequent report must cover the period from the end date of the prior report filed.

...

C. If the candidate has an opponent who is on the ballot or who is a declared write-in candidate, any single contribution of \$1,000 or more received or any single expenditure of \$1,000 or more made after the 14th day before any election and more than 24 hours before 11:59 p.m. on the day of any election must be reported within 24 hours of that contribution or expenditure. The candidate or treasurer is not required to include in this report expenditures for overhead expenses or compensation paid to an employee or other member of the campaign staff who has received payments at regular intervals that have been disclosed in previously filed campaign finance reports. As used in this paragraph, "overhead expenses" includes, but is not limited to, rent, utility payments, taxes, insurance premiums or similar administrative expenses.

...

§ 1020-A. Failure to file on time

• • •

2. Campaign finance reports. A campaign finance report is not timely filed unless a properly signed or electronically submitted copy of the report, substantially conforming to the disclosure requirements of this subchapter, is received by the commission by 11:59 p.m. on the date it is due. Except as provided in subsection 7, the commission shall determine whether a report satisfies the requirements for timely filing. The commission may waive a penalty in whole or in part if the commission determines that the penalty is disproportionate to the size of the candidate's campaign, the level of experience of the candidate, treasurer or campaign staff or the harm suffered by the public from the late disclosure. The commission may waive the penalty in whole or in part if the commission determines the failure to file a timely report was due to mitigating circumstances. For purposes of this section, "mitigating circumstances" means:

- **A.** A valid emergency determined by the commission, in the interest of the sound administration of justice, to warrant the waiver of the penalty in whole or in part;
- **B.** An error by the commission staff;
- C. Failure to receive notice of the filing deadline; or
- **D.** Other circumstances determined by the commission that warrant mitigation of the penalty, based upon relevant evidence presented that a bona fide effort was made to file the report in accordance with the statutory requirements, including, but not limited to, unexplained delays in postal service or interruptions in Internet service.

. . .

- **4-A. Basis for penalties.** The penalty for late filing of a report required under this subchapter is a percentage of the total contributions or expenditures for the filing period, whichever is greater, multiplied by the number of calendar days late, as follows:
 - **A.** For the first violation, 2%;
 - **B.** For the 2nd violation, 4%; and
 - C. For the 3rd and subsequent violations, 6%.

Any penalty of less than \$10 is waived.

Violations accumulate on reports with filing deadlines in a 2-year period that begins on January 1st of each even-numbered year. Waiver of a penalty does not nullify the finding of a violation.

A report required to be filed under this subchapter that is sent by certified or registered United States mail and postmarked at least 2 days before the deadline is not subject to penalty.

A registration or report may be provisionally filed by transmission of a facsimile copy of the duly executed report to the commission, as long as the facsimile copy is filed by the applicable deadline and an original of the same report is received by the commission within 5 calendar days thereafter.

94-270 COMMISSION ON GOVERNMENTAL ETHICS AND ELECTION PRACTICES

Chapter 1: PROCEDURES

SUMMARY: This Chapter describes the nature and operation of the Commission, and establishes procedures by which the Commission's actions will be governed.

. . .

SECTION 7. EXPENDITURES

. . .

3. Reporting Debts and Unpaid Obligations

- A. The following events constitute expenditures, even if the payment for a good or service has not been made at the time of the event:
 - (1) The placement of an order for a good or service;
 - (2) The signing of a contract for a good or service;
 - (3) The acceptance of the delivery of a good or the performance of a service by a vendor; or
 - (4) A promise or an agreement (including an implied one) that a payment will be made in exchange for a good or service.
- B. For reporting purposes, the expenditures listed in paragraph A are designated as debts or obligations prior to payment for the goods or services being made.
- C. If a person required to file a campaign finance report has a debt or obligation which remains unpaid at the end of the report period, the person shall report the date, amount, vendor, and purpose of the debt or obligation. If the exact amount is not known, the person filing the report shall report an estimate of the amount (preferably obtained in a written statement from the vendor).
- D. If a debt or obligation occurs in the same report period as a payment for that debt or obligation, the person filing the report will report only the payment, not the debt or obligation.
- E. A candidate or committee is not required to report a payment for a good or service in a 24-Hour Report, if the candidate or committee reported a debt for that good or service in the last regularly scheduled campaign finance report.
