



3,154 Survey respondents

- \triangleright 3,094 55+ adults responded
 - O 2,358 responded by mail
 - 156 responded by online link in the mailed survey
 - 564 responded to the flyer
 - 16 responded by telephone interview
 - 1,700 respondents commented on what would make aging in their home or community easier.









Does your home meet your current needs? (n=3,017)





Ageism in care








Caregiving

In the last 6 months, how often have you felt lonely and/or disconnected from other people because of your caregiving responsibilities? (n=623)




Respect (ageism proxy)

Please tells us how strongly you agree or disagree with this statement: "At my current age I feel that other people respect me." (n=3,063)




Information

What are the best ways for you to get information about available services for older adults? (n=2,980)




Emergency preparedness

Intersecting Needs

Examples of **small interventions** that participants suggested would have **large impacts on their daily lives**.

Intervention	Prevents
	Older people are unable to leave the house to go to medical appointments, grocery shopping, etc.
Snow removal	If a driveway isn't plowed, homecare or other providers can't get to them. Oil delivery may be interrupted, risking freezing.
	Slippery walkways cause falls when people go out to get mail, put trash out, get to their car
Trash removal	Inability to remove trash attracts pests; results in tripping and hygiene hazards
	Older people who have physical or financial difficulty maintaining their homes risk their own health and safety and others'.
Home repair (e.g., roof, infestations, safety equipment)	Care workers cannot enter homes that are unsafe from hoarding or infestations.
	Small repairs, if not attended to, can lead to crisis situations, e.g., small leak in roof can lead to structural damage and mold.






Selected employment status by age group, n=2,784



Have any of the following impacted your current employment status? (n=867)





What best describes the type of volunteer program? (n=1,061)







Statewide Demographics (survey respondents) Age


Distribution of unweighted and weighted responses by age, n=3,094


Gender

Distribution of unweighted and weighted responses by gender, n=3,094









Are you currently receiving the help that you need as a caregiver? (n=607)




Support community connections that improve quality of life, inclusion, and engagement of older adults
