St. Froid Lake supports a sport fishery of statewide significance for salmon, lake trout, and brook trout. Of local significance, a popular hook-and-line smelt fishery exists both winter and summer. Smelts also provide an extremely important forage species for salmon, lake trout, and to a lesser extent, brook trout. Although lake whitefish are listed as being present in the lake, the population is believed to be low and does not provide a sport fishery.


In 1969, togue were re-introduced to St. Froid Lake. The population is maintained by annual stocking as there has been little evidence of natural reproduction.
