

Haley Pond is located northeast of Rangeley Lake. Its main inlet enters the north end of the pond from Gull Pond. Its outlet flows southwest into nearby Rangeley Lake. The pond's shoreline is mostly developed.

Water quality in Haley Pond is good for coldwater gamefish. Remnant native populations of brook trout and salmon exist. However, heavy competition from yellow perch, suckers, and minnows hold back salmonid numbers from reaching sustainable fisheries. The pond is not stocked due to poor angler returns in earlier years.

Haley Pond is accessible from a boat launch off Route 4. The pond is open to fishing with the use of live fish as bait being prohibited in both the summer and winter seasons. See the lawbook for additional regulations.
