Sewall Deadwater Pond is a long and narrow, shallow, silt-bottom pond that is surrounded by a cedar forest. Brook trout habitat is marginal in the pond but it does support a fishery for small brook trout. Two tributaries and the outlet provide little spawning and nursery habitat for brook trout. Trout may seek refuge during summer months in these tributaries and small springs within the pond. Moose frequent the pond as evidenced by extensive game trails around the shoreline

The pond can be accessed via private gravel roads used for land management activities. A footpath exists off a gravel road to the north that leads to the beginning of the outlet stream. Watercraft must be hand-carried to the pond.
