Members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Berube. Senator BERUBE: Thank you Mr. President. Mr.

Senator BĔRUBÉ: Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I would like to explain the reason why some of us voted on the majority side of this Bill. This L.D. deals with two Constitutional Offices: the Attorney General's Office and the Secretary of State's Office. It extends the term of both, from the present two year to a four year term. Both Constitutional Offices would be popularly elected rather than selected by the Legislature.

Since it is a Constitutional Amendment, it would go to the people for their acceptance. The election would be held in 1992. There is only one state in our nation that elects the Attorney General by the legislative process and that is the State of Maine. There are only three states in the country, Maine, New Hampshire, and Tennessee, who elect the Secretary of State by the legislative process. I might add that the District Attorney's are elected by the people at large.

In the view of those of us who voted for the majority, it would make the position perhaps less political in that it would be less binding, if you will, to the party selecting that individual. The fact that they had a four year term would certainly be a positive direction to take.

I personally view that presently those Constitutional Offices are merely an extension of the Legislature and I think that this would be a fair process to allow the public to be able to select their people. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Esty.

Senator ESTY: Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. This is a very straightforward issue and I don't want to spend a great deal of time discussing it. I would just like to say that the system we have, presently, works very well. We have outstanding leadership in both of the positions and we have consistently had outstanding leadership in both positions in the past.

outstanding leadership in both positions in the past. I don't believe that by approving this process that the positions will become less political. In fact, I believe they may very well become more political. I just tend to believe that it is a system that is working very fine now and that we should maintain it. Thank you. President, men and women of the Senate. Before we Accept the Majority Report, which I am sure we are going to do, I would like to just bring to your attention that perhaps a need for some type of Bill or some mechanism to inform members of the Legislature as to what is being done and the purpose for Legislators attending conferences. It would seem to me that at some point we ought to be reporting back to this Legislature or some mechanism ought to be made available so that the public would know exactly where the dollars are being spent and why and for what purpose Legislators are traveling out-of-state. Thank you. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator

from Cumberland, Senator Clark.

Senator CLARK: Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. The good Senator from Franklin, Senator Webster, has suggested, ever so gently, that there may be need to report the expenses and the purposes for which Legislators attend educational and or legislative conferences. I do not disagree that there are mechanisms that provide for this reporting and that is, obviously, the public information and public access to all legislative documents, public hearings and meetings, not the least of which includes, as that good office that he represents knows, the expense sheets that Legislators submit.

That we should establish, in legislative mechanism and organization, a reporting much like one would report when one goes on a field trip that occurs sometimes in our lower grades in public schools, even a show and tell type of mechanism, I think does not legitimately address the value that gained by attending and participating in these legislative conferences and educational experiences.

Probably the single most visible mechanism for reporting the benefit of these experiences out of our
