Representative MARLEY of Portland moved that the House ACCEPT Report "A" Ought Not to Pass.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Orchard Beach, Representative Hogan.

Representative HOGAN: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to this Majority Report and I do so for a variety of reasons.

I wish that we would take this bill much more seriously than some have taken it and by that I mean that this is a bill of common sense and good conscience. Twenty-three deaths occurred from motorcycle accidents last year. Some had helmets, some didn't. Obviously, with some of these accidents nothing would save them. A suit of armor couldn't save them, but it should be noted that the Department of Human Services says that 36% of all motorcycle accidents results in traumatic head injuries. That's of last year, 36%. Now, that relates to our insurance system, whether it is Maine Care, whether it is private insurance policies or whether it be no insurance at all. We all know how these filter out to the rest of us, to the constituents of the State of Maine. I believe that we do have fiduciary agreement between the constituents of the State of Maine and our position here in the House and that is in regards to safety. We should do everything that we can in regards to safety. If you can vote for a seatbelt law you certainly can vote for a helmet bill.

I should note also, that your neighbors to the north, Canada, they have a helmet law for motorcyclists. They come to our state and they got it right. They got the same set of circumstances and the same set of reasoning that we are dealing with as well.

Also, our neighbors to the south, Massachusetts, they also dealt with that same set of values that we are dealing with to try and determine whether we should have a helmet law or not. They got it right, as well as many other states. I doubt very much that any of us would want our loved ones — daughters, granddaughters, sons and so forth — to get on a bike and go down the road, with the percentages and odds of something happening. It probably would never happen, but if you go down on a bike you have a major problem. Obviously, with a seatbelt they have the enclosure of the car, but with or without a helmet you have the pavement and that's all that you have to deal with and something bad is going to happen. You can put broken bones back together, but you can't put a head back together. So, for this small inconvenience I ask that you support my position of

not supporting this Majority Report and I respectfully ask for the yeas and nays.

The same Representative R EQUESTED a roll call on the motion to ACCEPT Report "A" Ought Not to Pass Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Sampson.

Representative **SAMPSON**: I am on the opposite side of that report from the good Representative and I just wanted to say that he is right. There were 23 accidents last year – fatalities from motorcycles – 13 of them were wearing helmets and what the statistics showed was that while the helmets do reduce head injuries they do not reduce neck injuries. There is a huge gap of information that we are needing and the day that we had this particular bill in there we were inundated by motorcycle enthusiasts not to take this particular right away from them, to go without a helmet if they so desire.

We know that there is a much bigger pool of people that are riding with helmets. It's a choice of educating them of the needs to protect themselves, but just as the seatbelts have taken a number of years to educate people and to encourage them to wear them I think we are having to do the same thing with helmets and I say let the riders decide. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Acceptance of Report "A" Ought Not to Pass Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.
