Mr. ALLEN: Mr. Speaker Members of the House: Discussion on the floor is not usual at this stage of a legislative bill, namely pending reference to a committee, but I would like to say just a word or two of explanation on this rent control bill which I filed here in

the Legislature this year.

This bill was filed because of the fact that the Federal government was not certain what it wanted to do in Washington, and I felt as I did last July when I introduced a rent control bill in the Special Session, that Maine's No. 3 necessity of life was certainly of vital concern to the people of this State. There-fore I brought into the Legislature in January the same bill which was reported out of committee in a redraft last July, a bill which at that time was an emergency measure when the country was certainly in a state of uncertainty on rent control, and a bill which was passed by a roughly 73 to 15 vote in favor because it had an emergency enactor on it.

This bill is simply a rent control measure, it is not an emergency enactor, but because of the fact that usually reliable sources which I have contacted in Washington have advised me that there is certainly some question as to what the Federal government is going to do on rent control, there is a very definite possibility that rent control may be turned back to the states, and because of that fact I also found out in Washington that the Federal government is definitely interested in finding the sentiment in the states for rent control, I now move you, Mr. Speaker, that this Bill Relating to Control of Rentals be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

The motion prevailed, and the bill was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Farmington, the House Mills voted to take from the table the 17th tabled and unassigned matter, Bill "An Act to Enforce Unfair Sales Practices in Cigarettes" (H. P. 1354) (L. D. 955) which in House was read the third time and tabled on March 11th by that gentleman pending passage to be engrossed.
