(1.) June 9, 2017 Commission Meeting Minutes

Maine Commission on Indigent Legal Services – Commissioners Meeting June 9, 2017

Minutes

Approval of the May 15, 2017 Commission Meeting Minutes	It was pointed out that Commissioner Logan's name was misspelled in several places in the draft minutes.	Commissioner Glazier moved for approval as amended to correct a misspelling of Commissioner Logan's name. Commissioner Welch seconded. All present voted in favor. Approved as amended.
Operations Reports Review	Chair Carey suggested dispensing with the oral presentation of the operations report, but indicated that the usual summary of the operations reports should be included in the minutes. The other Commissioners agreed, and the summary follows: 2,104 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in May. This was a 51 case decrease from April. The number of submitted vouchers in May was 1,992, a decrease of 964 vouchers from April, totaling \$1,093,494.79, a decrease of \$645,000 from April. In May, the Commission paid 1,750 vouchers totaling \$1,099,142.74, a decrease of 81 vouchers and \$75,000 from April. There were two paper vouchers submitted and paid in May. The average price per voucher was \$628.59, up \$69.06 per voucher over April. Appeal and Post-Conviction Review cases had the highest average vouchers. There were 11 vouchers exceeding \$5,000 paid in May. The monthly transfer from the Judicial Branch for counsel fees for May, which reflects April's collections, totaled \$61,532.22.

	Chair Carey raised the issue of continued payment of paper vouchers, suggesting that any attorney receiving payment should submit bills through DefenderData so as not to detract from the inclusiveness of the DefenderData statistics. Director Pelletier replied that many of the paper vouchers arose from the Commission assigning a lawyer to review potential errors in Maine Crime Lab DNA reports. This work, at least initially, does not pertain to a specific pending case and is not based on a formal assignment by the court. Director Pelletier stated that he was hesitant to include billing in DefenderData that was not based on a formal court assignment. Commissioner Logan stated that while he recognized Chair Carey's point, he did not feel that the number of paper vouchers, 16 in the first eleven months of the fiscal year, warranted changing practice. Chair Carey agreed, noting the particular difficulty of including cases in DefenderData that did not have a docket number. Chair Carey pointed out the large increase in the average price per voucher in May. Director Pelletier speculated that with a payment delay looming due to the budget shortfall, the attorneys were focused on submitting the largest of their invoices that were ready to be submitted. Commissioner Logan asked if payments from the revenue account were reflected in the DefenderData totals. Director Pelletier explained that DefenderData was able to pull funds from the revenue account to pay vouchers, that collected revenue was used exclusively to pay vouchers, and that voucher payments funded by the revenue account are included in the DefenderData statistics.	
	With regard to vouchers over \$5,000, Chair Carey requested that future operations report memos include the amount, as well as the nature, of the vouchers being described.	
Budget Update	Director Pelletier described the final Judiciary Committee votes on the MCILS budget, which were divided with 6 members voting to fund all MCILS budget requests, and 6 members voting for All Other funding FY'18 at the \$15.5 million FY'17 baseline and for FY'19 funding to be "parked" and only appropriated after recommendations of a working group (see below) were received and reviewed. 	voted to add an additional 2.8 million to FY'18 to cover the shortfall, and all voted for statutory changes the Committee had been working on, together with a working group to be created to review Commission operations and report back with recommendations. Director Pelletier related that the Committee vote did not endorse a "change package" that had been submitted by the Governor a few days earlier. The change package would have cut off MCILS funding on January 31, 2018, and set up a working group (different from the one endorsed by the Judiciary Committee) composed of the Commissioner of DAFS and the Director of the Office of Policy and Management. 	Director Pelletier then described the divided Appropriations Committee vote on the MCILS budget that largely mirrored the Judiciary Committee vote.	
	Chair Carey related that the statutory changes recommended by the Judiciary Committee were themselves the product of a working group and that he had hoped that the changes would have been given a chance to work before yet another "study" was undertaken. Commissioner Glazier questioned whether the expectation behind the change package was that lawyers would keep working on indigent cases after 1/31/18 without any hope of getting paid. Chair Carey pointed out that he understood the proponents of the change package to be seeking legislative changes to the system to be enacted between the mid-January report of the change package work group and the end of January.	
	Director Pelletier described the statute changes recommended by the Judiciary Committee as generally increase reporting and data gathering requirements, noting that the increased burden on the staff may create the need for additional staff.	
	The discussion then turned to the working group recommended by the Judiciary Committee. Commissioner Glazier pointed out that the Clifford Commission had addressed this work prior to the Commission's creation and questioned the need for more study. Chair Carey noted that the proposed group included two prosecutors

	and questioned the role of prosecutors in overseeing the delivery of indigent legal services. Commissioner Logan pointed out that the prosecutors would only play a role in whatever recommendations came out of the work group, and that the Legislature would have the final say. Both Chair Carey and Commissioner Logan agreed that the work group would likely proceed, that MCILS should cooperate with that process, and that the Legislature would take or leave whatever recommendations came out of the process.	
Process for New Initiatives	Chair Carey then raised a new subject that was not on the Agenda: deciding on a process to promote follow-through on a number of changes to Commission procedure that had been discussed generally, but had not been implemented. Chair Carey suggested that rather than toss around a number of ideas at a meeting without getting to resolution on any of them, as had happened frequently in the past, the Commission should devote meeting time to one or two items per meeting and implement those items before moving on. A general discussion followed, after which the following procedure was agreed on. The staff would put together a list of initiatives or reforms to be considered for the next meeting. At that meeting, the Commission would prioritize the list to determine which items should be addressed first. Meetings thereafter would focus on one or two of the items with the goal of addressing the details necessary for implementation. Once an initiative was	
	implemented, the Commission would move on to other items at subsequent meetings.	
Public Comment	Robert J. Ruffner, Esq.: Attorney Ruffner cautioned the Commission against letting its experience with the Appeal RFP negatively affect its overall view of contracts for indigent legal services. He repeated his view that contracts can have value and questioned whether the reason the bids were high for the appeal contract was because the bidders would be providing work that was superior to what is being done currently.

	Attorney Ruffner urged the Commission to try to "change the narrative" so as to shift the focus of legislators from the cost of indigent legal services to a focus on the quality of the services being provided.	
	Attorney Ruffner repeated his view that the Commission needs more staff, particularly with the added burdens being created by the Legislature, and that the Commission should assess and promulgate guidelines for attorney caseloads.	
Adjournment of meeting	The Commission voted to adjourn with the next meeting to be on July 11, 2017 at 9:30 a.m.	Commissioner Logan moved to adjourn. Commissioner Glazier seconded. All present in favor.

SUBJECT: JUNE 2017 OPERATIONS REPORTS

DATE: JULY 24, 2017

Attached you will find the June, 2017, Operations Reports for your review and our discussion at the upcoming Commission meeting. A summary of the operations reports follows:

- 2,097 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in June. This was a 7 case decrease from May.
- The number of vouchers submitted electronically in June was 2,313, an increase of 321 vouchers over May, totaling \$1,234,964.34, an increase of \$141,000 over May. In June, we paid 166 electronic vouchers totaling \$76,960.15, representing a decrease of 1,584 vouchers and \$1,022,000 compared to May. The large decreases in vouchers paid were the result of our FY'17 budget shortfall.
- There were no paper vouchers submitted and paid in June.
- The average price per voucher in June was \$463.62, down \$164.97 per voucher from May. For fiscal year 2017, the overall average price per voucher was \$554.80, up \$24.11 per voucher over fiscal year 2016.
- Appeal and Termination of Parental Rights cases had the highest average vouchers in June. There were no vouchers exceeding \$5,000 paid in June.

In our All Other Account, the total expenses for the month of June were \$58,471.39. Of that amount, just under \$13,000 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.

In the Personal Services Account, we had \$43,030.48 in expenses for the month of June.

In the Revenue Account, the June transfer of collected revenue, reflecting May's collections, totaled \$73,595.33, up \$12,000.00 from the previous month. In June, we paid \$73,678.15 in vouchers through the DefenderData system. Collections received during FY'17 totaled \$698,372.29, down approximately \$6,000.00 from the amount collected in FY'16.

In our Conference Account, we collected registration fees for the June minimum standards trainings and paid expenses related to the juvenile training replays on May 18th and 25th. The account balance stands at \$14,977.46.

Attached you will find the July, 2017, Operations Reports for your review and our discussion at the Commission meeting on August 8, 2017. A summary of the operations reports follows:

• 2,091 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in July. This was a 6 case decrease from June.

- The number of vouchers submitted electronically in July was 2,587, an increase of 274 vouchers over June, totaling \$1,479,530.84, an increase of \$245,000 over June. In July, we paid 5,160 electronic vouchers totaling \$2,749,134.43, representing an increase of 4,994 vouchers and \$2,673,000 compared to June. The large increases in vouchers paid were the result of paying carry-over vouchers as a result of the FY'17 budget shortfall.
- There were 3 paper vouchers submitted and paid in July totaling \$1,086.00.
- The average price per voucher in July was \$532.68, up \$69.06 per voucher from June, but well below the overall average price per voucher for FY'17 of \$554.80.
- Appeal and Post-Conviction Review cases had the highest average vouchers in July. There were 20 vouchers exceeding \$5,000 paid in July. See attached addendum for details.
- In July, we issued 88 authorizations to expend funds: 60 for private investigators, 23 for experts, and 5 for miscellaneous services such as interpreters and transcriptionists. In July, we paid \$144,315.13 for experts and investigators, etc. Of this amount, \$78,767.05 was carried over from FY'17 due to the budget shortfall.

In our All Other Account, the total expenses for the month of July were \$2,928,724.58. Of that amount, just over \$10,000 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.

In the Personal Services Account, we had \$49,204.29 in expenses for the month of July.

In the Revenue Account, the July transfer of collected revenue, reflecting June's collections, totaled \$43,709.11, down \$30,000.00 from the previous month.

In our Conference Account, we paid the last remaining expenses related to the juvenile training replays on May 18th and 25th and the June minimum standard replays. The account balance stands at \$13,382.81.

Attached are the portions of the biennial budget that relate to MCILS. They are somewhat confusing because the budget numbers appear in different places, and Part ZZZZZZ (the last part) alters some budget numbers that appear earlier. A summary follows.

For FY'18, our baseline All Other budget is \$18.3 million, equal to our All Other appropriation for FY'16. Funds for our staff positions are also included, as well as for our Other Special Revenue (OSR) account that covers training and counsel fee reimbursements. The All Other budget also includes \$2.8 million to cover costs pushed into FY'18 due to the FY'17 budget shortfall. For FY'19, our All Other budget is \$18.3 million and funds are also included for our staff positions. These funds, however, have been place in an OSR account. According to staff of the Office of Program and Fiscal Review, these funds are available for MCILS to spend without further legislative action. The budget also includes changes to our statute and creates a working group to review Commission operations and report back to the Legislature before the next session.

The arrangement for FY'19 presents two problems. First, if these funds remain in an OSR account throughout FY'19, our baseline budget for the next budget cycle will be \$0.00. Second, when creating the OSR account for FY'19, the Legislature included funds for our All Other budget and for our staff positions. It appears, however, that they neglected to include an additional amount for our regular OSR account to cover training and counsel fee reimbursements. The Commission will have to determine how to address these issues with the Legislature.

The hope is that by focusing narrowly on one to two items, the Commission can move to closure on policy and implementation.

POTENTIAL ACTION ITEMS

Geographic limitations on rosters. Travel and mileage policy for courts with plenty of lawyers.
