# October 16, 2018 Commission Meeting Minutes

#### Maine Commission on Indigent Legal Services – Commissioners Meeting October 16, 2018

#### **Minutes**

Approval of the September 11, 2018 Commission Meeting Minutes	No discussion of meeting minutes.	Item/Responsible Party Commissioner Logan moved for approval, Commissioner Welch seconded. All voted in favor. Approved.
Operations Reports Review	September 2018 Operations Report: 2,170 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in September. This was a 493 case increase over August. The number of submitted vouchers in September was 2,638, a decrease of 261 vouchers from August, totaling \$1,470,777, a decrease of \$41,000 from August. Director Pelletier noted that the totals for September had returned to average levels. The average price per voucher was \$557.24, up \$50.81 per voucher over August. Appeal and Post-Conviction Review cases had the highest average vouchers. There were 13 vouchers exceeding \$5,000 paid in September. 107 authorizations to expend funds were issued in September, and we paid \$101,714 for experts and investigators, etc. The monthly transfer from the Judicial Branch for counsel fees for September, which reflects August's collections, totaled \$86,999, down approximately \$2,000 from August. No attorney complaints were received in September.	
Fee Schedule Rule Discussion	The Commissioners reviewed voucher data provided by staff as well as additional analysis of the data presented by Commissioner Welch. The data included the number of vouchers paid and number exceeding the cap, the percentile breakdown of the over the cap vouchers, and the mean and median voucher amounts, for probation violation, PCR, juvenile, child protection

	petition, appeal, murder, class A, class B/C person, class B/C property, and misdemeanor cases. After review of the data, it was clear that four categories had a large number of vouchers that exceed the cap by wide margins: probation violation, appeals/PCR, child protection, and juvenile. The Commissioners agreed that Class A, B, C, and misdemeanor caps do not need to be adjusted. A discussion ensued about creating a separate juvenile felony category at an increased amount over the misdemeanor cap amount. Commissioner Logan suggested a \$1,000 juvenile felony cap amount, then gather data to see if it's an appropriate amount. The Commissioners tentatively agreed with this proposal. For probation violation cases, Chair Carey suggested a \$750 cap so it would be at the 90 <sup>th</sup> percentile for cap overage and also on par with misdemeanor cases. The Commissioners agreed with this proposed change. The Commissioners requested that staff provide additional voucher data on termination of parental rights cases and on PCR and appeal vouchers in cases other than murder for review and discussion at the next meeting. Chair Carey and Commissioner Logan will begin work on amendments to the murder cap language. The Commissioners postponed discussion of the approval process for vouchers over the cap for a later date after the caps are adjusted.	
Sixth Amendment Center Study	Director Pelletier provided a status update on the Sixth Amendment Center's activities and progress. It has completed its statistical analysis and is now scheduling onsite visits for each of the five counties.	
Resource Counsel Update	Director Pelletier relayed that September was the first month of voucher submissions by resource counsel and that the program appears to be working as intended. Director Pelletier noted that issues are coming to the staff's attention more promptly and now there is a local resource to address the issues that arise.

Public Comment	Tina Nadeau, Esq.: Attorney Nadeau urged the Commission to set a realistic fee cap for appeal and post-conviction review cases, noting that the pool of attorneys handling the more serious cases is small and that an unrealistic cap will cause some people to self-select off the rosters. Attorney Nadeau expressed a concern that sometimes not enough work is being done on appellate and PCR cases, with attorneys attempting to stay under the fee cap. Attorney Nadeau said that if the Commission want people to do cases properly, then it needs to pay people appropriately. Attorney Nadeau urged the Commission to have more transparency in the selection process of future resource counsel and to adopt an application process. She also requested the Commission mail written notification to all rostered attorneys about the resource counsel program and to have counsel distribute feedback forms to every client.	
Executive Session	The Commissioners entered into executive session to discuss investigation of attorney billing. Upon emerging from executive session, the Commissioners stated that no votes were taken.	Commissioner Logan made a motion to move into executive session for purposes of discussing investigation of attorney billing. Chair Carey seconded. All approved.
Adjournment of meeting	The Commission voted to adjourn with the next meeting to be on November 13, 2018 at 9:30 a.m.	Commissioner Logan moved to adjourn. Commissioner Welch seconded. All present in favor.

Attached you will find the October, 2018, Operations Reports for your review and our discussion at the Commission meeting on November 13, 2018. A summary of the operations reports follows:

- 2,447 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in October. This was a 277 case increase over September.
- The number of vouchers submitted electronically in October was 2,907, an increase of 269 vouchers over September, totaling \$1,483,077.37, an increase of \$13,000 over September. In October, we paid 3,155 electronic vouchers totaling \$1,644,971.77, representing an increase of 882 vouchers and \$378,000 compared to September.
- There were no paper vouchers submitted and paid in October.
- The average price per voucher in October was \$521.39, down \$35.85 per voucher from September.
- Appeal and Post-Conviction Review cases had the highest average vouchers in October. There were 9 vouchers exceeding \$5,000 paid in October. See attached addendum for details.
- The contract amount paid for representation in Somerset County in October was \$22,687.50.
- In October, we issued 146 authorizations to expend funds: 93 for private investigators, 40 for experts, and 13 for miscellaneous services such as interpreters and transcriptionists. In October, we paid \$81,538.50 for experts and investigators, etc. In October, one request for funds was reduced or modified. See attached addendum for details.
- In October, we received three complaints about attorneys. One involved lack of contact by the attorney. During subsequent discussions with staff, the attorney acknowledged that communication should have been better. The staff will be looking out for similar complaints regarding this attorney. Another came from a court clerk about an attorney not showing up for a Lawyer of the Day assignment. In this court, LOD assignments are made well in advance, and the staff instructed the clerk to find replacement counsel for any additional dates that had been

assigned to this attorney. Finally, a person who was found guilty after trial on a misdemeanor called the office with a complaint that, based on content and demeanor, was judged not credible by the Executive Director. The attorney, however, will be notified of the complaint.

In our All Other Account, the total expenses for the month of October were \$1,766,940.01. Of that amount, approximately \$16,500 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.

In the Personal Services Account, we had \$78,750.49 in expenses for the month of October. You will recall that at the beginning of the fiscal year, payroll had been incorrectly charged to our traditional Personal Services Account, rather than the special revenue account that currently holds our budget. This error has now been corrected and, as reflected on the personal services report, all amounts for the current year have been charged to our current account.

In the Revenue Account, the transfer for October, reflecting September's collections, totaled \$82,863.81, a decrease of approximately \$4,000 from the previous month.

With respect to training revenue and expenses, formerly reflected in our conference account report, those are now also accounted for in our single special revenue account. However, they are itemized in a box on the all other report so you can see the monthly transactions. During October, we paid expenses related to video replays of a day-long Juvenile training and we collected revenue for our upcoming minimum standards training.

During October, the Sixth Amendment Center requested various additional information. I understand from speaking with David Carroll in early October that site visits for Androscoggin, Somerset, and Aroostook counties were planned to be completed during October. David also stated that site visits for York and Cumberland counties were planned for November, keeping their work on their originally projected timeline.

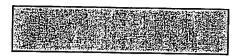
On October 17, 2018, the Executive Director met with the State Budget Officer and representatives of the Department of Administrative and Financial Services to present the Commission's budget request for the upcoming biennium, FY'20-FY'21. Copies of the budget submission documents are attached.

Regarding the current fiscal year budget, new cases created in August and September outpaced projections, as did voucher submission totals. In addition, the staff fell behind on voucher approval compared to where it was at the end of the last fiscal year. As a result, the Commission carried \$546,647 in unpaid vouchers into the second quarter, whereas it carried no unpaid vouchers from last fiscal year into the first quarter. But because the staff did not remain as current as it had been in voucher payment, allotment in the amount of \$310,496 remained unspent in the first quarter. The net result is that the Commission fell behind budget projections by \$236,151.

Fortunately, the Commission carried over \$300,000 in unspent collected revenue into the current fiscal year. We should be able to access these funds by financial order later in the year. In fact, at the request of the Budget Officer, I have submitted a financial order to provide allotment authority to spend the carried over funds. A copy of the financial order is attached. Note that the financial order is in the amount of \$270,741. On the advice of the Budget Officer, approximately \$58,000 in carried over revenue was not addressed as that may be needed to cover a \$58,000 negative balance in our traditional All Other account that arose due to fiscal notes on legislation passed in the last legislative session.

Finally, revenue collections for the first quarter outpaced our allotment for revenue by \$76,000, revenue that can also be accessed by financial order. So more than enough revenue is available to cover the first quarter shortfall, and the staff will continue to monitor voucher submissions, which hopefully will match projections for the balance of the year.

That the State Controller increase allotment in account 014-95F-Z112-01, Maine Commission - Indigent Legal Services by \$270,741 in the All Other line category for the purpose of allotting the unencumbered balance forward to pay the cost of indigent legal services and,

that the State Controller authorize the expenditure in accordance with the attached "Revision of the Work Program for Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2019", for which this shall be our sufficient warrant.

#### Statement of Fact

This financial order will allot the unencumbered balance forward to pay for indigent legal services. The Commission receives revenue from people who are ordered to reimburse the state for some or all of the cost of indigent legal services provided to them. These reimbursements flow into account 014-95F-Z112-01, Maine Commission - Indigent Legal Services and are used to pay the cost of indigent legal services. Reimbursement revenue collected during fiscal year 2017-18 exceeded the expenditure allotment for this account due in large part to a statutory amendment set forth in Public Law 2017, chapter. 284, section UUUU-15, and failure to allot these funds will be detrimental to the Commission's ability to pay the cost of indigent legal services in fiscal year 2018-19.
