

# Taller Than the Statue of Liberty!

The observatory is, at 420 feet and 42 stories, the tallest occupied structure in Maine. The design of obelisk towers pays homage to the local granite industry, which harvested granite from nearby Mount Waldo for the construction of the Washington Monument.



Visitors to the observatory will enjoy the spectacular 360° views of the Penobscot River and Bay, the Maine countryside and the distant mountains to the west.

The Penobscot Narrows Bridge and Observatory is the crown jewel of coastal Maine with its spectacular views, stunning design and unique link to historic Fort Knox. The only observatory bridge in the Western Hemisphere and the tallest in the world, the structure has won multiple awards for engineering excellence.

# Maine's Largest Historical Fort

Discover the rich history of the region through Fort Knox.

Fort Knox, Maine's largest historic fort, features stunning military architecture and master granite craftsmanship. Constructed between 1844 and 1864 by master craftsmen (and never fully completed), this is New England's finest unmodified specimen of military architecture of the period.

The fort was strategically located on the narrows of the Penobscot River to protect the river valley from naval attack. Although it never saw combat, Fort Knox was garrisoned during the Civil and Spanish-American Wars.

Fort Knox bears the distinction of being Maine's first granite fort and is one of the best-preserved seacoast fortifications in America. Troops were stationed here during the Civil War for defensive purposes. During the Spanish-American War about 500 troops from Connecticut used the site for training purposes prior to reassignment. Today, visitors love exploring the vast structure and learning of the rich History of America's first Fort Knox.
