H-1B Rural Healthcare Grant Program

Description: The intent of this grant program is to alleviate healthcare workforce shortages by creating sustainable employment and training programs in healthcare occupations (including behavioral and mental healthcare) serving rural populations.

<u>Vermont Community Development Program</u>

Description: VCDP funds are able to assist communities with a wide range of projects, because the funds can be used for many types of expenditures. VCDP is a resource for housing, economic development, public facilities, public services, and planning. Types of activities within these project areas include: • Housing rehabilitation and acquisition, lead abatement, home ownership assistance • Economic development loans to businesses

- Water, sewer, and other infrastructure serving economic development or housing
- Rehabilitation or acquisition of public facilities; senior, childcare, assisted living, or homeless facilities Handicap accessibility modifications Planning Disaster assistance Deadline: Open

Funding Amount: Maximums per grant type; 10% match of cash or cash-in-kind goods or services is required for all grants.

Implementation Grant (IG) –\$50,000 minimum to \$500,000 maximum or \$1,000,000 maximum-Specialist. Implementation Grant for Brownfield Activities

Home Access Grants (HA): \$5,000 to \$100,000

Disaster Assistance (DA): The Disaster Assistance Program provides assistance to municipalities and their residents who are victims of damage caused by floods, Scattered Site Grant (SS) - \$50,000 minimum to \$1,000,000 maximum.

Planning Grant (PG) - \$3,000 minimum to \$60,000 maximum.

Development Accessibility Modification Grant (AM) - \$5,000 to \$100,000.

Tribal

Energy and Mineral Development Program (EMDP)

Description: Projects that conduct resource inventories and assessments, feasibility studies, or other pre-development studies necessary to process, use and develop energy and mineral resources. These resources and their uses include, but are not limited to, biomass (woody and waste) for heat or electricity; transportation fuels; hydroelectric, solar, or wind generation; geothermal heating or electricity production; district heating; other forms of distributed energy generation; oil, natural gas, geothermal, and helium; sand and gravel, coal, precious minerals, and base minerals (lead, copper, zinc, etc.).

Grants.gov is a centralized location for grant seekers to find and apply for federal funding opportunities.

An individual or organization must register before applying for a federal grant. Once registered an organization can submit grant applications on behalf of a state government, nonprofit organization or private business.
