





Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

What is FMA?

Flood Mitigation Assistance is a nationally competitive grant program that provides funding to states, local communities, federally recognized tribes and territories. Funds can be used for projects that reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to buildings insured by the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).


What Can FMA Help Fund?

Project Scoping

(Projects must have FEMA Benefit Cost Analysist of 1.0 or higher)

Who is Eligible to Apply?

Local Governments, Federally recognized Tribal Governments, and State Agencies who have a FEMA-approved Local Hazard Mitigation (LHMP).



Cost Share Requirements

FMA cost share is 75% federal cost share funding/25% non-federal cost share funding. Economically Disadvantaged Rural Communities (EDRCs) are eligible for 90% federal cost share/10% non-federal cost share. EDRCs are communities of 3,000 or fewer people, identified by the applicant, with residents having an average per capita annual income no more than 80% of the national per capita income, based on the best available data.

FEMA provides 100% federal cost share funding for management costs.
