Grants are awarded on an annual basis through an application and selection process overseen by a volunteer selection panel. Please review the following criteria before submitting your grant application:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Your running program should be more than just a one-time event. It should be a structured running program that ideally utilizes the RRCA's Kids Run the Nation youth running curriculum. The goal of your program should be to have kids running regularly, more than once each week for multiple weeks, as opposed to participating in a single event. However, the program may culminate in a goal fun run or other organized running event. • Your program may be a start-up program or a pre-existing program. • Your program must be gender-inclusive, encouraging and welcoming participation by children of all genders. The program may not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, ethnic origin, or economic status. The program may outline age groups and may indicate a minimum and maximum age for participation. • Your program should focus on participation, but may include competitive running activities or events. • Your running program must maintain policies and procedures that ensure the safety of the participants and outline expectations of program leaders. It has many uses ranging from recreation to scientific analysis to emergency response.</p> <p><i>The National Map</i> is a suite of products and services that provide access to base geospatial information to describe the landscape of the United States and its territories. <i>The National Map</i> embodies 11 primary products and services and numerous applications and ancillary services.</p> <p><i>The National Map</i> supports data download, digital and print versions of topographic maps, geospatial data services, and online viewing. Customers can use geospatial data and maps to enhance their recreational experience, make life-saving decisions, support scientific missions, and for countless other activities. Nationally consistent geospatial data from <i>The National Map</i> enable better policy and land management decisions and the effective enforcement of regulatory responsibilities. <i>The National Map</i> is easily accessible for display on the Web through such products as topographic maps and services and as downloadable data. The geographic information available from <i>The National Map</i> includes boundaries, elevation, geographic names, hydrography, land cover, orthoimagery, structures, and transportation.</p> <p>The majority of <i>The National Map</i> effort is devoted to acquiring and integrating medium-scale (nominally 1:24,000 scale) geospatial data for the eight base layers from a variety of sources and providing access to the resulting seamless coverages of geospatial data. <i>The National Map</i> also serves as the source of base mapping information for derived cartographic products, including 1:24,000 scale US Topo maps and georeferenced digital files of scanned historic topographic maps. Based on three powerful principles—involve everyone, focus on what matters most, and play the long game—Community Heart & Soul helps towns move toward a brighter, more prosperous future by bringing residents closer together.</p> <p>The Community Heart & Soul Seed Grant Program provides \$10,000 in startup funding for resident-driven groups in small cities and towns across the United States to implement the Community Heart & Soul model. Eligible use of funds includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Heart & Soul Coaching; • Project Coordination; and • Project-Related Expenses. <p>Although there is no charge to use the Community Heart & Soul model, most communities budget around \$15,000 for engagement and programmatic costs. Additional funds are needed to pay for project coordination and services provided by a Heart & Soul Coach. Heart & Soul Coaches are trained by Community Heart & Soul staff to provide training, skill building and guidance to Heart & Soul teams. Successful grantees are required to contract with a Heart & Soul Coach. While fees vary between Coaches, on average, Coaching services cost \$20,000 over two years.
