WSW provides professional opportunities for artists at various stages of their careers and promotes programs designed to stimulate public involvement, awareness, and support for the visual arts.</p> <p>WSW is accepting applications for its Art-in-Education Artist's Book Residency, which will provide an up-to ten-week residency to two emerging women artists to create a new artist's book and teach young people in WSW studios. Generally, the resident dedicates her first month to producing a limited-edition artist's book, which is hand-printed and bound in the studio. WSW can provide technical advice; training on new equipment, techniques, and materials; and production assistance.</p> <p>During the second half of the residency, the artist works with young people in WSW's studios, teaching one to two days per week for three to four weeks, and visiting the students twice in school. Studio space and equipment is reserved for students during program hours, but artists may work at any time outside of AIE.</p> <p>The program provides a stipend of \$350 per week for up to ten weeks, up to \$750 for materials, and up to \$250 for travel within the continental United States. Eligible use of funds includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Heart &amp; Soul Coaching;</li> <li>• Project Coordination; and</li> <li>• Project-Related Expenses.</li> </ul> <p>Although there is no charge to use the Community Heart &amp; Soul model, most communities budget around \$15,000 for engagement and programmatic costs. Additional funds are needed to pay for project coordination and services provided by a Heart &amp; Soul Coach. Heart &amp; Soul Coaches are trained by Community Heart &amp; Soul staff to provide training, skill building and guidance to Heart &amp; Soul teams. Successful grantees are required to contract with a Heart &amp; Soul Coach. While fees vary between Coaches, on average, Coaching services cost \$20,000 over two years. On average, it costs \$57,500 annually for two years to implement Community Heart &amp; Soul.
