COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES September 22nd, 2025, MEETING Held in Hybrid Format - In Person (19 Union Street, Augusta, Maine) and via ZOOM

Commissioner David chaired the meeting on Zoom and called it to order at 8:30 AM. Also present were Commissioners O'Brien, Douglas, Walker, and Sanders (via Zoom).

AGENDA

Commissioner Walker moved, seconded by Commissioner Douglas, to adopt the Agenda and Consent Agenda to accept the Investigators' recommended decisions in each of the cases listed on the Consent Agenda (see listing beginning on Page 2).

MINUTES

Commissioner David moved, seconded by Commissioner Douglas, to adopt the August Commission Meeting Minutes.

4 in favor | 0 opposed | 1 abstained (Walker).

ADMINISTRATION

Monthly reports: Executive Director Thomson Crossman discussed reporting on the following Commission activities:

- Personnel: A report was placed on file.
- Compliance: Since the last meeting, there have been 2 unsuccessful conciliations and 0 successful conciliations, with 2 reasonable grounds cases remaining in active conciliation.
- New Charges: 50 new complaints were filed in June, with a total of 73 new Respondents.
- Withdrawals and dismissals: 17 issued in June, including 9 administrative dismissals, 1 right-to-sue letters, and 4 settlements (2 after MHRC investigation and 2 through MHRC's mediation program) with a total of \$16,750 to Complainants.

Quarterly reports:

- Training & Education: Commission staff attended or presented at 18 events in the fourth quarter of FY25.
- Financial Reports: a financial report was placed on file.

New Business: No new business.

CASES VOTED ON IN A.M. SESSION

E23-0395, Ann Royall (Westbrook) v. Ankle & Foot Associates (Portland). Ann Royall presented her position. Attorney Caihlan Snyder presented the Respondent's position. Investigator Jane O'Reilly reviewed her report and recommendations and answered the Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner David moved, seconded by Commissioner Douiglas, to find there are No Reasonable Grounds to believe that Foot & Ankle Associates discriminated against Ann Royall on the basis of sex and there are No Reasonable Grounds to believe that Foot & Ankle Associates discriminated against Ann Royall for engaging in MHRA- and/or WPA-protected activity, and the complaint should be dismissed in accordance with 5 M.R.S. § 4612(2).

5 in favor | 0 opposed.

H/PA25-0140, Manley Alley (Lewiston) v. Bread of Life Ministries (Augusta). Attorney Michael Spalding presented the Complainant's position. Laura Briggs presented the Respondent's position. Investigator Jane O'Reilly reviewed another investigator's report and recommendations and answered the Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner O'Brien moved, seconded by Commissioner Walker, to find there are No Reasonable Grounds to believe that Bread of Life Ministries discriminated against Manley Alley on the basis of disability in violation of the MHRA, and the complaint should be dismissed in accordance with 5 M.R.S. § 4612(2).

5 in favor | 0 opposed.

H25-0148AB, Amada Minks (Sanford) v. Sanford Housing Authority (Sanford), Thomas Kerrigan (Sanford). Amada Minks presented her position. Attorney Caihlan Snyder presented the Respondent Sanford Housing Authority's position. Investigator Nupur Leva reviewed her report and recommendations and answered the Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner David moved, seconded by Commissioner Sanders, to find there are No Reasonable Grounds to believe that Sanford Housing Authority discriminated against Amada Minks on the basis of her disability and/or sex and there are No Reasonable Grounds to believe that Thomas Kerrigan discriminated against Amada Minks on the basis of her disability and/or sex, and the complaint should be dismissed in accordance with 5 M.R.S. § 4612(2).
