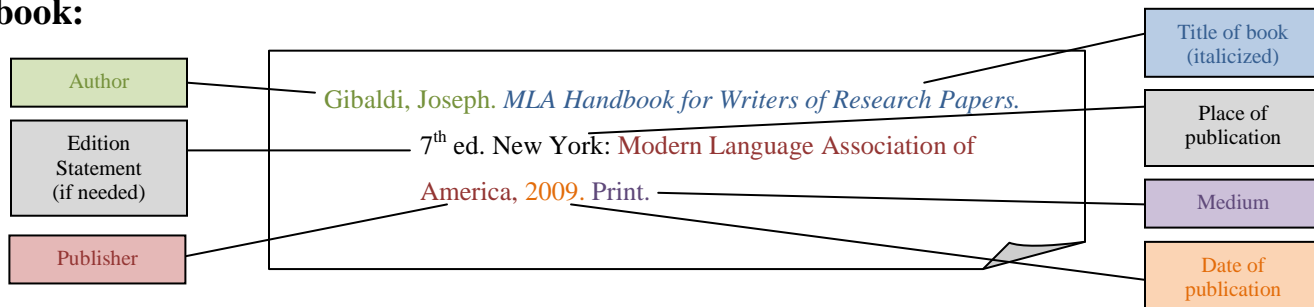


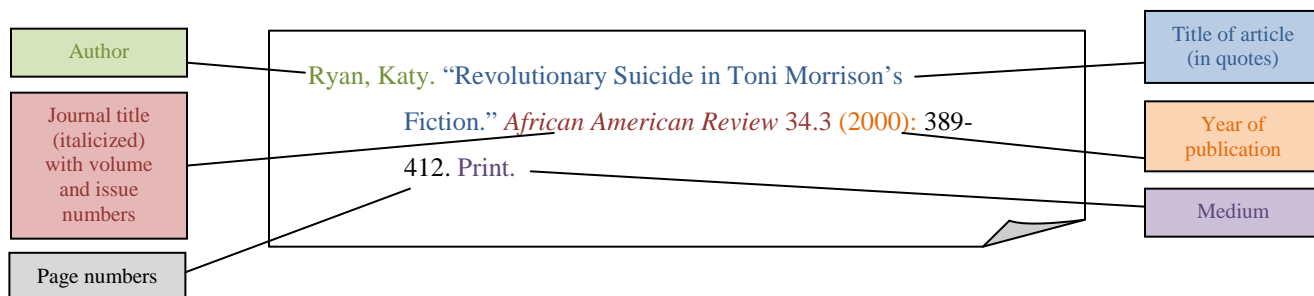
Elements of an MLA Citation

Tip: pay close attention to punctuation

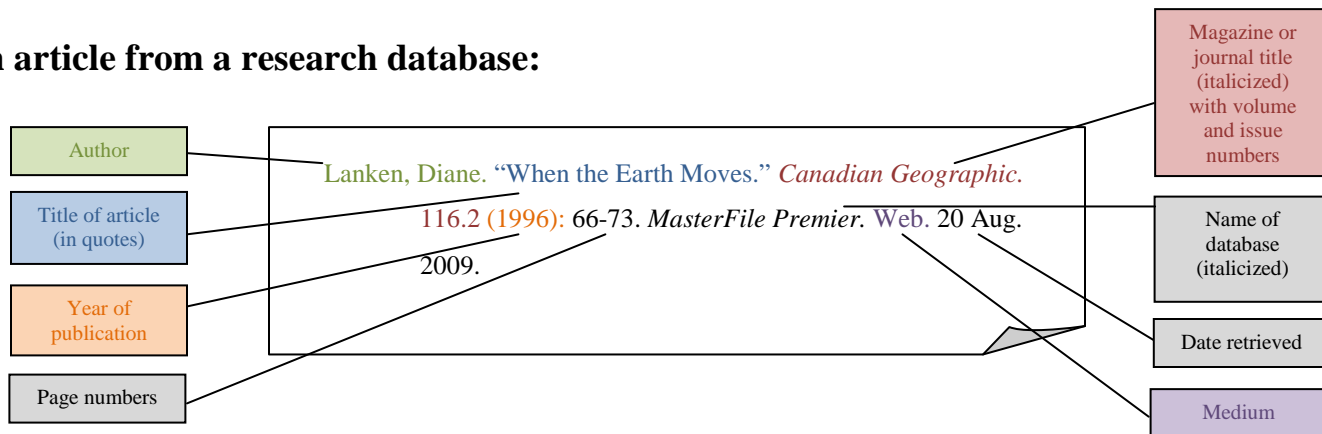

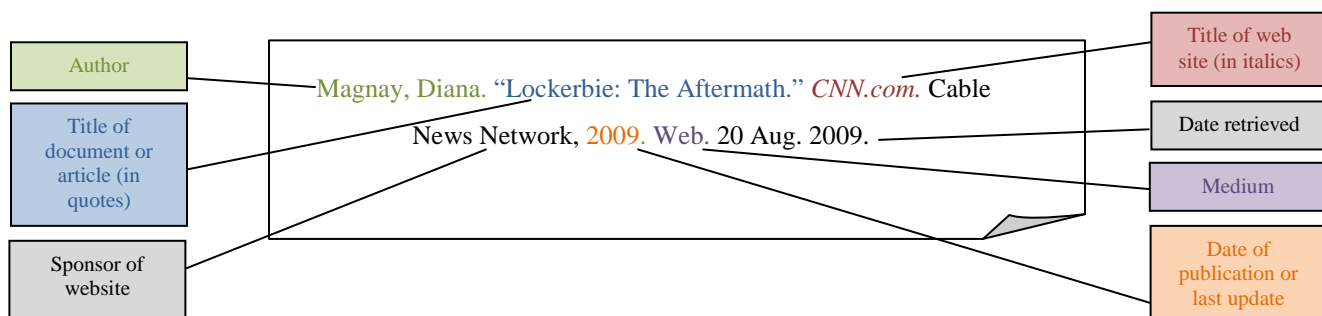

MLA Works Cited: Books, DVDs, & E-books

Type of Source:	Using Noodlebib? Choose this citation type:	Work Cited Example: As with all citations, enter the information provided by your sources.	In-text Example: Your in-text citation must point to an item in your Works Cited list. Use the first word of your citation: either the author or the title.
Book by a single author	Book > Print tab You can enter the ISBN # for a book. Noodlebib will format the citation for you.	Gibaldi, Joseph. <i>MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers</i> . 7th ed. New York: MLA, 2009. Print. Capitalize every significant word in the title. Indent the second and subsequent lines of the citation.	Use last name of the author and the page number in parenthesis. Example: Proper citation style helps to prevent inadvertent plagiarism (Gibaldi 212). If the name of the author appears as part of your text, cite only page number Example: According to Gibaldi, proper citation style helps to prevent inadvertent plagiarism (212).
Book by 2 or 3 authors Reverse the name of the first author only.	Book > Print tab > add another contributor	Jamieson, Lyn M. and Thomas J. Orr. <i>Sport and Violence</i> . Elsevier: Amsterdam, 2009. Print. If there are more than 3 authors, name only the first and add et al., OR list them all. Example: Smith, John, et al.
