I. SANCTIONS


The Board held hearings in this matter on April 14, May 12, and June 9, 2022. During deliberation on June 9, 2022, a majority of the Board found that Paul G. Gosselin, D.O. (“Licensee”) issued vaccine exemption letters stating that he had conducted evaluations of patients without seeing or examining the patients, obtaining their medical histories, obtaining medical records, consulting their primary care providers, or considering guidance published by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, subjecting him to discipline pursuant to 32 M.R.S. Section 2591-A(2)(F). A majority of the Board also found that the Licensee failed to create and/or maintain adequate medical records for patients who received vaccine exemption letters, subjecting him to discipline pursuant to 32 M.R.S. Section 2591-A(2)(F).

The Board imposed the following sanctions, effective on the date this Order is signed.

- a. One year of probation during which:
 - i. The Licensee must obtain 10 hours of continuing education on the topic of medical decision making and 10 hours of continuing education on the topic of medical documentation, which may be counted towards his biennial continuing medical education requirement; and
 - ii. The Licensee may not issue any vaccine exemption letters.
- b. Costs of hearing of \$1,000, to be paid within one year.

The Licensee's license suspension will end with the issuance of this Order. A full Decision and Order will follow.

II. APPEAL RIGHTS

Pursuant to the provisions of 10 M.R.S. Section 8003(5) and 5 M.R.S. Section 11002(3), any party that appeals this Order must file a Petition for Review in the Superior Court within 30 days of receipt of this Order. The petition shall specify the person seeking review, the manner in which they are aggrieved, and the final agency action which they wish reviewed. It shall also contain a concise statement as to the nature of the action or inaction to be reviewed, the grounds upon which relief is sought, and a demand for relief. Copies of the Petition for Review shall be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, upon the State of Maine Board of Osteopathic Licensure, all parties to the agency proceedings, and the Attorney General.
