Maine Commission on Public Defense Services – Commissioners Meeting August 26, 2024 Meeting Minutes

Commissioners Present: Donald Alexander, Michael Carey, Roger Katz, Kimberly Monaghan, David Soucy, & Josh Tardy

PDS Staff Present: Executive Director Jim Billings and Deputy Executive Director Ellie Maciag.

Agenda Item:	Discussion/Outcome:
Approval of the July	Commissioner Alexander suggested minor edits to the minutes.
22, 2024	Commissioner Katz moved to approve the minutes with the edits suggested by Commissioner
Meeting Minutes	Alexander, seconded by Commissioner Soucy. All voted in favor; approved.
Executive Session	Commissioner Katz moved to go into the executive session for the purpose of discussing pending litigation, seconded by Commissioner Alexander. All voted in favor; motion prevailed, and the Commission went into executive session. The Commission returned from executive session.
Report of the	Executive Director Billings provided the following report:
Executive Director	
	Dollar amounts of vouchers continue to rise as the \$150 hourly rate is included in a higher percentage of vouchers. We surveyed attorneys about their billing practices to see if the change to encourage monthly billing has impacted billing practices. Approximately 1/3 of the respondents indicated that they bill monthly, 1/3 wait until the end of the case, and roughly 1/3 included a mixture of billing every 90 days or waiting for a particular event. The unrepresented list has been hovering around 700-900 people since May. Audit Counsel Art Washer ran calculations and estimated that the unrepresented list amounts to approximately \$2 million of unbilled attorney fees.
	The number of attorneys on the active roster remains around 150, of which approximately 34 are taking trial-level child protective cases and 35 are taking adult criminal cases.
	As of last week, 289 attorneys completed the 2024 annual renewals. The deadline was July 15 ^{th,} and we gave a 30-day grace period. We have been following up to try to get more attorneys to renew.

	Public Defender Offices: The Caribou office is still under construction. Toby Jandreau is still working with the RDU. Some of the RDU members have been redirected to different offices. Max Coolidge was hired as the District Defender for the Downeast Office. Jesse Archer was hired as the District Defender for the Tri-County (Androscoggin, Oxford, and Franklin) Office. The Downeast, Tri-County, and Highlands offices are all hiring for assistant defenders. Molly Owens has been hired as the Parents Counsel Division Chief.							
Budget	Executive Director Billings: Deputy Executive Director Maciag included an Excel sheet containing the budget proposal. The initiatives are included in order of priority.							
	One initiative is to hire staff dedicated to make individual phone calls to attorneys to try to find counsel for unrepresented persons. There is also a proposal to increase the number of parents attorneys so that there are enough employed counsel to represent one parent in 1/3 of the PC cases in the state.							
	We are also asking for more central office staff. We have close to 70 employees now and 85 authorized positions. We've quadrupled the size of our agency in the last year. We cannot continue we the skeleton crew we have.							
	There is a request for FY27 to increase the number of employed parents counsel so there are enough to represent one parent in half of the PC cases in the state. Initiatives 10-11 are for the appellate and PCR public defender units. We are also asking for positions for interns. Initiative 13 is to get authorization to expand the Rural Practice Clinic to other parts of the state. We would also explore cooperation with universities to provide housing for students to practice in the clinics.							
	The appropriations for "all other" are going to increase for FY 26-27—despite the expansion of public defender offices—because of arrears billing from assigned counsel. The \$12 million is not the total; it is the amount over baseline. We estimate having \$45 million in billable hours (300,000 x \$150).							
	We are working on increasing the starting pay for AD II's. We have had several candidates withdraw their applications when they found out the starting pay.

	Another proposal is to pay a stipend to encourage attorneys to take cases of certain types or in certain underserved geographic areas.
	Chair Tardy asked whether the Commission needs to take any action on the budget because this is just a proposal for Executive Director Billings to submit to DAFS for their review. AAG Hudson-MacRae responded that the Commission does need to approve and submit a budget.
	Chair Tardy and Commissioner Alexander expressed support for the budget.
	Commissioner Carey expressed hesitance about the stipend idea and proposed a pilot project for it. Executive Director Billings replied that Oregan is the pilot; Oregan has had success with placing cases with stipends. Commissioner Alecxander supports the stipend proposal. Commissioner Carey said he supports a graduated payment structure, but this seems like a back-door way to do that. He is concerned about the process being fair. Commissioner Katz shares some of Commissioner Carey's concerns. He also worries about how some people might perceive this as a request for a higher rate of pay, especially in light of the hourly rate increase to \$150. Discussion ensued about the hourly rate increase, the backlog, and the unrepresented list. Executive Director Billings said Oregan did a market analysis and found that private attorneys were making \$334 per hour. He added that we need to do that in Maine. Commissioner Alexander moved to approve the budget proposal, seconded by Commissioner Carey. All voted in favor; approved.
Review of	Commissioner Alexander left the meeting because he was the presiding officer in these matters.

Decision In re: Daniel Feldman	AAG Hudson-MacRae provided an overview of the Commission's options, which are to adopt, modify, or reject the presiding officer's recommended decisions, or to send the cases back to the presiding officer
Case Nos. 2023-33 and 2023-34	for the taking of more evidence.
	The Commission first addressed the recommended decision on case number 2023-34: Commissioner Carey moved to adopt the recommended decision, seconded by Commissioner Katz. No discussion. Chair Tardy, Commissioner Carey, Commissioner Katz, and Commissioner Soucy voted in favor. No one voted against. The recommended decision was adopted.

	The Commission then addressed case number 2023-33:								
	Commissioner Carey moved to adopt the recommended decision, seconded by Chair Tardy. No discussion. Chair Tardy, Commissioner Carey, Commissioner Katz, and Commissioner Soucy voted in favor. No one voted against. The recommended decision was adopted.								
	Commissioner Carey moved to authorize Chair Tardy to sign all documents necessary to transmit this decision consistent with the Commission's votes, seconded by Chair Tardy. No discussion. Chair Tardy, Commissioner Carey, Commissioner Katz, and Commissioner Soucy voted in favor. No one voted against. The motion prevailed.								
Chapter 5	Executive Director Billings explained that there was previously a public hearing on this proposed Rule, that there was stakeholder feedback, and that staff tried to address the public comments in the recent revisions.								
	Commissioner Carey moved to put the Rule back out for public comment, but not hold another public hearing. Seconded by Commissioner Alexander. No discussion. Chair Tardy, Commissioner Carey, Commissioner Katz, Commissioner Alexander, and Commissioner Soucy voted in favor. No one voted against. The motion prevailed.								
Public Comment	Robert Ruffner, Esq.: Offering different rates of pay may have unintended consequences. Neil Prendergast and I have been doing the 7-day reviews in Aroostook and it can be exhausting. We have brought on two other attorneys. It is not "easy work." I support the budget initiatives.

August 2024 Operations Report

- 2,382 new cases were opened in the defenderData system. This was a 193 case decrease from July. Year to date, new cases are down 18.2% from last year from 6,060 at this time last year to 4,954 this year.
- The number of vouchers submitted electronically was 3,623 an increase of 4 vouchers from July, totaling \$3,892,617, an increase of \$36,398 from July. Year to date, the number of submitted vouchers is up by approximately 6.6%, from 6,786 at this time last year to 7,237 this year, with the total amount for submitted vouchers up approximately 23.5%, from \$6,266,124 at this time last year to \$7,740,400 this year.
- We paid 3,369 electronic vouchers totaling \$3,565,416 representing a decrease of 259 vouchers and a decrease of \$135,305 compared to July. Year to date, the number of paid vouchers is up approximately 4.2%, from 6,714 vouchers at this time last year to 6,997 this year, and the total amount paid is up approximately 19.3%, from \$6,085,589 this time last year to \$7,266,137 this year.
- The average price per voucher was \$1,058.30 up \$38.26 per voucher from July. Year to date, the average price per voucher is up approximately 14.5%, from \$906.40 at this time last year to \$1,038.46 this year.
- Central Office Resource Counsel and Post Conviction Review had the highest average voucher total. There were 28 vouchers exceeding \$7,500 paid in August. See attached addendum for details.
- We issued 158 authorizations to expend funds: 68 for private investigators, 62 for experts, and 28 for miscellaneous services such as interpreters and transcriptionists. We paid \$238,565 for experts and investigators, etc. Nine requests were denied.
- There were no attorney suspensions.
- In the All Other Account, the total expenses were \$3,944,070. Approximately \$94,927 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.
- In the Personal Services Accounts, we had \$323,300 in expenses.
- The July transfer from the Judicial Branch for collected counsel fees was \$23,597.
- As of September 12, 2024, there are 146 rostered attorneys of which 96 are available for trial court level work.

• For the first 2 months of this fiscal year, submitted hours are up approximately 11% over the same 2-month period last year. And August 2024 submitted hours are 7.3% greater than August 2023 submitted hours.
