# State & Federal Benefits

## Burial, Dependents, and Survivors' Benefits

Maine is home to four state veterans' cemeteries: Two in Augusta (Civic Center Drive & Mt. Vernon Rd.), one in Caribou, and one in Springvale. Veterans, spouses, and their dependents are eligible to be interred in Maine's veterans' cemeteries. The State of Maine provides the plot, will open and close the grave and supplies perpetual care, at no cost to the family. The VA will supply the stone at no cost.

Persons eligible for burial in one of Maine's veterans' cemeteries must have received an honorable discharge or a general discharge under honorable conditions and are:

- Individuals who have served for a minimum of 24 continuous months or the full period for which the person was called to active duty.
- Individuals who served and died as a result of injury, disease or illness sustained while serving on active duty as National Guard.
- Members of the reserve components (Reserve or National Guard) who served for at least 20 years.
- Eligible veterans include active-duty veterans, current and former National Guard personnel or current or former Reserve component personnel. Individuals who served in the Maine National Guard Reserve Units in Maine, or who were Maine residents serving in other states may be buried (or inurned) at the cost of the State of Maine. \*Length of service and residency requirement applies; otherwise, eligible current or former National Guard/Reservists may elect to be buried, fee applies, contact cemetery staff at 207-287-3481 for specifics.

**Spouses, widows, widowers and dependent children are also eligible to be buried in Maine's veterans' cemeteries. Eligible dependents include:**

- Unmarried minor children.
- Unmarried dependent children enrolled in secondary school.
- Unmarried adult children who became incapable of self support before reaching 18 years of age on account of mental or physical disability and are unmarried.

Please contact the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services' cemetery office for any questions about eligibility and to make arrangements for a burial.

## Military Funeral Honors

Military Funeral Honors is now an entitlement for all honorably discharged veterans. The rendering of Military Funeral Honors is a tribute that veterans and their families justly deserve. It is a way to show our nation's deep gratitude to those who, in times of war and peace, have faithfully defended our country.

Family members of a deceased veteran should notify the Funeral Director of their desire to have Military Funeral Honors rendered at the interment of their loved one. The Funeral Director should contact the appropriate military branch Casualty Assistance Center (CAC) of the deceased veteran. Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of the VA's 135 national cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a Government headstone or marker, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost to the family. Some veterans may also be eligible for burial allowances. Cremated remains are buried or inurned in national cemeteries in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national cemetery include burial with the veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependent's name and date of birth and death inscribed on the veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family. Eligible spouses and dependents may be buried even if they predecease the veteran.

Funeral or cremation arrangements must be made with a funeral provider or cremation office. Please be aware that any item or service obtained from a funeral home or cremation office will be at the family's expense and will not be covered by the VA.

To schedule a burial, please fax the deceased veteran's military discharge documentation to the above fax number and follow-up with a phone call.

## Headstones

The VA will furnish upon request, at no charge to the applicant, a government headstone or marker for the unmarked grave of any deceased eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world, regardless of their date of death.

Please note that veterans who are buried or memorialized in a national cemetery, state veterans' cemetery, or military post/base cemetery will have their headstone or marker ordered by the cemetery officials for that facility. Spouses and dependents are not eligible for a government-furnished headstone or marker unless they are buried in a national cemetery, state veteran's cemetery, military post/base cemetery, or tribal cemetery.

## Burial Flag

A United States flag is provided, at no cost, to drape the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased Veteran who served honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces. U.S. Post Offices are the primary issuing point for burial flags, although not all local post offices have burial flags on hand. Alternatively, a funeral director or representative from a regional VA office can assist with obtaining a flag.

## Burial and Plot Allowances

Some veterans may be eligible for burial or plot allowances if they died as a result of a VA service-connected disability, were receiving a VA pension at the time of their death, or died while hospitalized at the VA, among other criteria. These allowances may be used to help cover funeral home costs or the expenses of burial at a private cemetery. Contact the VA to determine if your veteran family member is eligible for a burial allowance.

## Additional Burial Eligibility

The Director may allow the earth burial in one of the cemeteries of a person, and any spouse or minor child of that person, who meets the criteria established by the department by rule and who died while:

- Member or former member of the Maine National Guard; or
- A member or former member of the state military forces, or the Reserve Components of the United States Armed Forces assigned to a unit within the State of Maine; or
- A current member of a Reserve Officer Training Corps of the United States Armed Forces assigned to a unit within the state of Maine; or
- A current Reserve Officer Training Corps Cadet of the United States Armed Forces assigned from outside of Maine that maintained a Maine residence for five years preceding the death of the person or eligible dependent; or
- A member or former member of the National Guard, state military forces, or the Reserve Components of the United States Armed Forces from outside of Maine and who was not a Maine resident for five years preceding the death of the person or eligible dependent will be eligible for burial with an Interment Fee.; or



- A current Reserve Officer Training Corps Cadet of the United States Armed forces assigned from outside of Maine and who was not a Maine resident for five years preceding the death of the person or eligible dependent will be eligible for burial with an Interment Fee.

Survivor Outreach Services is a holistic and multi-agency approach to delivering services to military families in their home communities.

#### Outreach coordinators will:

- Provide expertise on state and federal survivor benefits, as well as connections to other entitlements and local resources.
- Arrange for estate and financial advice as needed
- Connect survivors with appropriate mental health support and counseling as requested
- Educate the military command, community social services, and support agencies of the needs of military survivors

Family members who have lost a loved one in military service should contact the Coordinator for connections to resources and assistance.

## Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) is a tax free monetary benefit paid to eligible survivors of military service-members who died in the line of duty or eligible survivors of veterans whose death resulted from a service-related injury or disease.

**In order to qualify for DIC, a surviving spouse must meet one or more of the following criteria:**

- Was married to a service member who died on active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty training.
- Validly married the veteran before January 1, 1957.
- Married the veteran within 15 years of discharge from the period of military service in which the disease or injury that caused the veteran's death began or was aggravated.
- Was married to the veteran for at least one year.
- Had a child with the veteran.
- Cohabited with the veteran continuously until the veteran's death or, if separated, was not at fault for the separation.

## Survivors Pension

The Survivors Pension benefit, which may also be referred to as the Death Pension, is a tax-free monetary benefit payable to a low income, unremarried surviving spouse and/or unmarried child(ren) of a deceased veteran with wartime service.

**The deceased veteran must have met the following service requirements:**

- For service on or before September 7, 1980, the veteran must have served at least 90 days of active military service, with at least one day during a wartime period.
- If he or she entered active duty after September 7, 1980, generally he or she must have served at least 24 months or the full period for which called or ordered to active duty with at least one day during a wartime period.
- Was discharged from service under other than dishonorable conditions.



**While an un-remarried spouse is eligible at any age, a child of a deceased wartime veteran must meet one of the following criteria:**

- Under 18, or
- Under age 23 if attending a VA-approved school, or
- Permanently incapable of self-support due to a disability before age 18.

Eligibility is also established by the survivor's family income, which must be less than the amount set by Congress to qualify for the Survivors Pension benefit.

- There are two main GI Bill® programs offering education assistance to survivors and dependents of veterans. GI Bill® is a registered trademark of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). - The Marine Gunnery Sergeant John David Fry Scholarship (Fry Scholarship) is available for children and spouses of servicemembers who died in the line of duty after September 10, 2001.
- The Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance (DEA) Program offers education and training opportunities to eligible dependents of veterans who are permanently and totally disabled due to a service-related condition or of veterans who died while on active duty or as a result of a service-related condition.

Surviving family members may be eligible for more than one of these programs, but most survivors will be required to choose between the two.

**Both will cover education opportunities, such as:**

- College, business, technical, or vocational programs
- Certification tests
- Apprenticeship and/or on-the-job training
- Tutorial assistance
- Work-study

Each program differs in how benefits are allocated (monthly payments made to student vs tuition reimbursement and stipends paid to schools) and the duration of benefits.

All providers are thoroughly reviewed and vetted prior to their approval to accept benefits. MESAA scope of responsibility includes approval of high schools, adult education centers, employers providing on-the-job training and apprenticeship training, license and certification testing, as well as all certificate and degree levels of post-secondary education. MESAA is also a resource for individuals needing assistance in accessing or applying for GI Bill® education benefits.

The USM Veterans Upward Bound (VUB) program is a free pre-college program to help low-income veterans develop the academic and personal skills necessary for success in the academic and personal skills necessary for success in post-secondary education. Eligible veterans seeking to become first-generation college students will receive intensive year-round support, including academic tutoring, VUB advising, preparation for college entrance exams, information on federal student financial aid programs, as well as coaching on economic and financial literacy. Participants will also receive guidance on general college readiness, study skills, career development, and personal and leadership growth.

Veterans' Dependents Educational Benefits Program (VDEB) provides a 100% waiver for tuition and all related fees for spouses and dependents of veterans who have lived in Maine for at least five years and continue to live in Maine, and have a service-connected 100% total and permanent VA disability, or who meets the listed criteria.

- Was killed in action;
- Died from a service-connected disability as a result of service;
- At the time of death was totally and permanently disabled due to a service-connected disability, but whose death was not related to the service-connected disability; or
- Is a member of the Armed Forces on active duty who has been listed for more than 90 days as missing in action, captured or forcibly detained in the line of duty.

Schools covered under this program are those in the University of Maine System, Maine Community College System, and Maine Maritime Academy. Spouses may be admitted to a certificate, associate's, bachelor's or master's degree program. Children may use the benefit for a certificate, associate's or bachelor's program and must enroll before the age of 23.

The program is administered by the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services. More information can be found by contacting the Bureau.

## Free In-State College Tuition for National Guard

On June 25, 2018, Governor LePage signed into law, LD 1736, "An Act To Broaden Educational Opportunities to Members of the Maine National Guard and Provide Financial Assistance to Veterans."

Current law provides a 100% tuition waiver for Maine's National Guard members to attend all schools in the University of Maine and Maine Community College Systems and Maine Maritime Academy. LD 1736 will allow all eligible National Guard members to also attend the Maine Criminal Justice Academy, or a private nonprofit postsecondary education institution in the State, registered with the Military Bureau as a participating institution.

Eligible Maine National Guard service members must be fully qualified drilling members of the Guard, be enrolled or accepted into a postsecondary education institution and not have previously earned a bachelor's degree or equivalent.

## Education and Training Programs from the VA

The VA offers multiple programs to advance the education and skills of veterans and service members. Some might find that they are eligible for more than one benefit or that one program is more suited to their education and training goals than another. Spouses and family members may also be eligible for education and training assistance. In fact, 25% of those benefiting from the VA's education programs are non-veterans.

**Among the programs offered by the VA are:**

- The Post-9/11 GI Bill®, or "Forever GI Bill®" offers higher education and training benefits to veterans, service members, and their families who served after September 10, 2001.
- Traditional eligibility included individuals who after September 10, 2001 - had 90 days or more of active duty service; were honorably discharged veterans; or were honorably discharged veterans who were discharged with a service-connected disability after 30 days.
- In November 2017, the Harry W. Colmery Educational Assistance Act of 2017, otherwise known as the "Forever GI Bill®", expanded eligibility to Purple Heart recipients and Reservists ordered to active duty for medical care or a disability exam on or after September 11, 2001 (effective August 1, 2018).
- Other provisions included eliminating the 15-year limitation for using GI Bill® benefits for service members released from active duty on or after January 1, 2013; the ability to use GI Bill® benefits at technical and vocational schools; and expanded eligibility and housing allowance support for reserve components, among others.

**The Montgomery GI Bill® assists active duty and Reservists with the pursuit of higher education degrees, certificates, and other education and training. There are two components to the program:**

- Montgomery GI Bill® Active Duty (MGIB-AD)—for active duty members who enroll and pay \$100 per month for 12 months and are then entitled to receive a monthly education benefit once they have completed a minimum service obligation.
- Montgomery GI Bill® Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR)—for Reservists with a six-year obligation in the Selected Reserve who are actively drilling.

The Reserve Educational Assistance Program (REAP) provides educational assistance to members of the Reserve components called or ordered to active duty in response to a war or national emergency declared by the president or Congress.

**NOTE:** The National Defense Authorization Act of 2016 ended REAP on November 25, 2015. Some individuals will remain eligible for REAP benefits until November 25, 2019, while others are no longer eligible for REAP benefits.

The Post-9/11 GI Bill® in many ways has replaced REAP because it also provides educational assistance benefits for Reserve and National Guard members called to active duty on or after September 11, 2001, and in many cases provides a greater benefit than REAP.

Veterans Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) is available for service members who elected to make contributions from their military pay to participate in this education benefit program. The government matches their contributions on a 2-for-1 basis. Participants in this program may use these benefits for degree, certificate, correspondence, apprenticeship/on-the-job training programs, and vocational flight training programs.

**The VA's Survivors and Dependents Educational Assistance Program consists of:**

- The Marine Gunnery Sergeant John David Fry Scholarship (Fry Scholarship). Available for children and spouses of Service members who died in the line of duty after September 10, 2001.
- The Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance (DEA) Program. The program offers education and training opportunities to eligible dependents of veterans who are permanently and totally disabled due to a service-related condition or of veterans who died while on active duty or as a result of a service-related condition.

Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) is the VA program that assists veterans with service-connected disabilities to achieve employment or enhance their ability to function independently at home and in the community. Eligible veterans must have a VA service-connected disability rating of at least 20 percent with an employment handicap, or be rated 10 percent with a serious employment handicap. Eligible veterans must be discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

**Depending on your needs and goals, VR&E services may include:**

- A complete evaluation to determine your abilities, skills, and interests for employment.
- Vocational counseling and rehabilitation planning for employment services.
- Employment services such as job training, resume development, and other work-readiness support
- On the Job Training (OJT), apprenticeships, and non-paid work experiences.
- Post-secondary training at a college, vocational, technical, or business school.
- Supportive rehabilitation services including case management, counseling, and medical referrals.
- Independent living services if you are unable to work due to the severity of your disabilities.

The USM Veterans Upward Bound (VUB) program is a free pre-college program to help low-income veterans develop the academic and personal skills necessary for success in the academic and personal skills necessary for success in post-secondary education. Eligible veterans seeking to become first-generation college students will receive intensive year-round support, including academic tutoring, VUB advising, preparation for college entrance exams, information on federal student financial aid programs, as well as coaching on economic and financial literacy. Participants will also receive guidance on general college readiness, study skills, career development, and personal and leadership growth.

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, also known as "VR," is a Department of Labor program that helps people who have disabilities find and keep a job. VR helps people who have physical, mental, or emotional disabilities. There is no charge for diagnostic services, vocational evaluation, counseling, or job placement assistance. A VR counselor will first help you explore possible career opportunities by helping you assess your interests and aptitudes. From there, a VR counselor will:

- Identify skills and training needed to prepare you for a new career.
- Locate or develop specific training programs with special accommodations to meet your needs.
- Purchase tools, uniforms, or basic equipment needed to either start a new job or keep an existing job. Occasionally, VR will also be able to help pay for some medical/ psychological services.

**To be eligible you must:**

- Have a disability that keeps you from getting or keeping a job; and
- Need VR services to find or keep a job.

### Maine's Occupational Licensing Initiative

Since 2012, Maine's Department of Professional and Financial Regulation (DPFR) has taken great strides to accelerate the licensing process for veterans in the state. Individuals who have military experience and training and who wish to obtain an occupational license receive appropriate credit for their military training and experience. The program allows for quicker, easier licensing for veterans who have demonstrable military experience in various professional fields. The Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation has flexibility in evaluating and crediting military experience toward licensure and continuing education requirements, reducing the need for veterans to undergo duplicative and expensive training.

The VR&E program assists veterans with service-connected disabilities prepare for, obtain, and maintain suitable employment, and/or live as independently as possible. A Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor (VRC) will work with the veteran to determine if an employment handicap exists. An employment handicap exists if the service-connected disability impairs the ability to obtain and maintain employment.

## Healthcare

### VA Health Benefits

Veterans with active military service and an honorable discharge may be eligible for VA health care. Enrollment in VA health care provides comprehensive care and services designed to promote good health, preserve your current health, or restore you to better health. This includes treating illnesses and injuries, preventing future health problems, improving functional abilities and enhancing quality of life.

Health care provided by the VA includes preventive care, inpatient care, ancillary services, specialty care, and mental health services. Inpatient care includes a full spectrum of treatment services, such as medical, surgical, mental health, dialysis and acute care. The VA also provides care for mental health needs, such as counseling and specialized programs including intensive case management, work programs, and psychosocial rehabilitation.

Veterans receiving care from the VA may be treated on-site during inpatient hospitalization, at one of their primary or specialty care clinics, at a Community Based Outpatient Clinic or Health Care Center, in a VA Community Living Center (formerly known as a VA nursing home), or in a residential care facility.

VA operates over 1,700 health care facilities, not all services are available at every location. In that instance, the VA may refer patients to another VA facility or the VA will pay for care from a community provider through its Community Care or Veteran's Choice Programs.

Eligibility for VA health care is determined by need, gross household income, and service-connection status. The VA operates eight priority groups of health care access, with the VA absorbing the costs of caring for more severely disabled or low-income veterans. Other veterans without service-connected disabilities and higher gross incomes may have some care provided by the VA, with co-pays.

### PACT Act

The PACT Act is a law that expands VA health care and benefits for Veterans exposed to burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic substances. This law helps us provide generations of Veterans—and their survivors—with the care and benefits they've earned and deserve.

The PACT Act is perhaps the largest health care and benefit expansion in VA history. The full name of the law is The Sergeant First Class (SFC) Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act.

#### The PACT Act brings these changes:

- Expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras.
- Adds 20+ more presumptive conditions for burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic exposures.
- Adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation.
- Requires VA to provide a toxic exposure screening to every Veteran enrolled in VA health care.
- Helps us improve research, staff education, and treatment related to toxic exposures.

Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange or other herbicides during military service may be eligible for a variety of VA benefits, including disability compensation for diseases associated with exposure. Their dependents and survivors also may be eligible for benefits.

"Agent Orange" refers to a blend of tactical herbicides the U.S. military sprayed in the jungles of Vietnam and around the Korean demilitarized zone to remove trees and dense tropical foliage that provided enemy cover. Veterans who may have been exposed to Agent Orange include veterans who were in Vietnam, the Korean Demilitarized Zone, on Thai Air Force bases, who flew on or worked on C-123 Aircraft, and those who served on ships and boats around Vietnam at the time of the war.

VA and federal law presumes that certain diseases are a result of exposure to these herbicides. This "presumptive policy" simplifies the process for receiving compensation for these diseases since VA foregoes the normal requirements of proving that an illness began during—or was worsened by—your military service.

VA offers eligible veterans a free Agent Orange Registry health exam to identify possible long-term health problems related to exposure. VA also offers health care, disability compensation, and other benefits to eligible veterans for certain disease conditions, as well as benefits for children of Vietnam Veterans who developed spina bifida. Dependents & survivors may also be eligible for other benefits.

Certain illnesses are associated with Gulf War service in the Southwest Asia theater of military operations from August 2, 1990 to present. Medically unexplained illnesses (commonly referred to as Gulf War illness or Chronic Multi-symptom illness) are a significant concern for some veterans who served during the Gulf War.

**For VA benefit purposes, Gulf War service is active military duty service in any of the following areas at any time from August 2, 1990 to present:**

- Iraq
- Kuwait
- Saudi Arabia
- The neutral zone between Iraq and Saudi Arabia
- Bahrain
- Qatar
- The United Arab Emirates (U.A.E.)
- Oman
- Gulf of Aden
- Gulf of Oman
- Waters of the Persian Gulf, the Arabian Sea, and the Red Sea
- The airspace above these locations

A prominent condition affecting Gulf War veterans is a cluster of medically unexplained chronic symptoms that can include fatigue, headaches, joint pain, indigestion, insomnia, dizziness, respiratory disorders, and memory problems. VA refers to these illnesses as "chronic multi-symptom illnesses" and "undiagnosed illnesses."

VA presumes certain chronic, unexplained symptoms existing for six months or more are related to Gulf War service without regard to cause. These "presumptive" illnesses must have appeared during active duty in the Southwest Asia theater of military operations or by December 31, 2001, and be at least ten percent disabling.

For veterans who meet the theater of operations and timeframe eligibility, the VA offers a free Gulf War Registry health exam to find possible long-term health problems related to Gulf War service. The Registry health exam includes an evaluation of environmental exposure and medical history, laboratory tests, and a physical exam. You do not need to be enrolled in VA health care to receive this free exam.

A VA health professional will then connect eligible veterans to key services, which may include health care, disability compensation, and other benefits. Veterans' dependents and survivors may also be eligible for benefits.

Veterans, including activated Reservists and members of the National Guard, who served in a theater of combat operations after November 11, 1998 are entitled to an extended period of eligibility for health care for five years post discharge, if discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

**Combat veterans who enroll during the five-year eligibility period will receive:**

- Free medical care and medications for any conditions related to their service in theater, with no co-pays.
- Immediate benefits of health care coverage.
- Dental treatment necessary for the one-time correction of dental conditions, provided they did not receive a complete dental examination 90 days prior to release.



For veterans who do not enroll during the five-year eligibility period, eligibility for VA health care enrollment and subsequent care is based on other factors such as a compensable service-connected disability, or the veteran's financial circumstances. Consequently, combat veterans are strongly encouraged to apply for enrollment within their enhanced eligibility period, even if they perceive that they do not need immediate medical care.

### Airborne Hazards and Burn Pit Exposures

On April 25, 2022, VA announced that nine rare respiratory cancers are now presumed service-connected disabilities due to military environmental exposures to fine particulate matter.

VA will process disability compensation claims for these conditions for Veterans who served any amount of time in the Southwest Asia theater of operations beginning Aug. 2, 1990, to the present, or Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Syria or Djibouti beginning Sept. 19, 2001, to the present. VA added three presumptive conditions related to particulate matter exposure.

The new presumptive conditions are asthma, rhinitis, and sinusitis. To be eligible for benefits, you must have gotten one of these conditions within ten years of your separation from active service.

**This will expand benefits for Veterans who served in:**

Afghanistan, Djibouti, Syria, and Uzbekistan during the Persian Gulf War, from September 19, 2001, to the present, or the Southwest Asia theater of operations from August 2, 1990, to the present.

If you have a pending claim for one or more of these conditions, you don't need to do anything. We'll send you a decision notice when we complete our review.

### Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)

Can occur after someone goes through a traumatic event like combat, assault, or disaster. It is common to have reactions such as upsetting memories of the event, increased jumpiness, or trouble sleeping. If the reactions don't go away over time, or they disrupt your life, you may have PTSD.

Many factors can increase the chance that someone will have PTSD, many of which are not under that person's control. Factors like previous traumatic exposure, age, and gender, can affect whether or not a person will develop PTSD. PTSD symptoms usually start soon after the traumatic event, but they may not appear until months or years later.

**Typical symptoms of PTSD include:**

- Feelings of hopelessness, shame, or despair.
- Depression or anxiety.
- Drinking or drug problems.
- Physical symptoms or chronic pain.
- Employment problems.
- Relationship problems, including divorce.

The VA operates a National Center for PTSD dedicated to research and education on trauma and PTSD. The intent of the National Center is to assure that the latest research findings on PTSD help those exposed to trauma. The VA offers a range of counseling options and medications for the treatment of PTSD. Veterans experiencing PTSD may also be eligible for disability compensation and benefits.

Any veteran who was sexually traumatized while serving in the military is eligible to receive counseling regardless of gender or era of service. Medical services are also available at each VA Medical Center and can be accessed by contacting the Military Sexual Trauma Coordinator (or Women Veterans Program Manager). Assessment and referral for sexual trauma counseling are available at all Vet Centers.

Services for MST may include individual or group counseling, marital and family counseling, health care, disability compensation, referrals to community agencies, and substance abuse counseling. For referrals to services, please contact the coordinator.

TRICARE is the health care program for uniformed service members and their families, including active duty and retired members of the: U.S. Army; U.S. Air Force; U.S. Navy; U.S. Marine Corps; U.S. Coast Guard; the Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service; and the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association.

### **TRICARE provides comprehensive coverage to all beneficiaries, including:**

- Health plans—TRICARE provides up to 11 plans, depending on the service member's eligibility.
- Special programs—Beneficiaries may be eligible for supplemental programs to address needs related to cancer, autism, chiropractic, assistive technologies, and cutting-edge treatments for some conditions.
- Prescriptions—TRICARE covers most prescription drugs approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Prescription drugs may be available as part of either the pharmacy or medical benefit.
- Dental Plans—Dental care required to address a medical condition, injury, or disease is covered by TRICARE as part of the medical benefit. Non-medical care, such as preventive services, restorative services, and orthodontics are provided as part of the following plans: TRICARE Active Duty Dental Program, TRICARE Dental Program, and TRICARE Retiree Dental Program.

CHAMPVA is a comprehensive health care program in which the VA shares the cost of covered health care services and supplies with beneficiaries. Due to the similarity between CHAMPVA and TRICARE, the two are often mistaken for each other. CHAMPVA is a national VA program while TRICARE is a regionally managed health care program that primarily serves active duty and retired members of the military and their families or survivors.

In some cases, a veteran may appear to be eligible for both or either program on paper; however, if you are a military retiree, or the spouse of a veteran who was killed in action, you are and will always be a TRICARE beneficiary and cannot choose between the two programs.

### **CHAMPVA provides coverage to the spouse or widow(er) and to the children of a veteran who:**

- Is permanently and totally disabled (P&T) because of a service connected disability, or
- Died as a result of a service-connected disability or who at the time of death was rated P&T due to service-connected conditions, or
- Died while in an active duty status and in the line of duty

CHAMPVA covers most medically necessary health care services, including ambulance services, ambulatory surgery, durable medical equipment (DME), family planning and maternity, hospice, inpatient services, mental health services, outpatient services, pharmacy, skilled nursing care and transplants. CHAMPVA beneficiaries may receive medical services at a VA Medical Center, clinic, or from nonVA providers.

## Dental Services/Access to Oral Healthcare

In 2020, the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services (MBVS) conducted a six-month needs assessment to better understand how Maine's veterans are accessing dental care and what the available options are in the state. As a result of the project a 105-page report was created and a Dental Access and Information page was added to the Bureau's website which includes a list of Maine dental clinics, options for veterans' dental insurance, the University of New England's Dental Hygiene Clinic Fee Schedule, and the University of Maine at Augusta's Dental Hygiene Clinic Fee Schedule. ## Maine Veterans' Dental Network

In 2021, the Maine Veterans' Dental Network (MVDN) was formed through a generous grant from Northeast Delta Dental. Services will be provided on a first come first serve basis and will be available until the grant funds run out. The MVDN covers the following dental procedures: Preventative, diagnostic, restorative, oral surgery, and major restorative. Services not provided under the grant: dental implants, orthodontics, fixed bridges, telehealth, and PPE charges.



**To qualify for the program veterans must meet the following criteria:**

- Be a Maine resident.
- Not 100% service-connected to the VA (meaning you don't already receive dental care through Togus or the Bangor or Portland Community Based Outpatient Clinics).
- Cannot afford and/or Does Not have dental insurance of any kind.
- Cannot afford to pay for dental care out of pocket.
- Served on Active Duty (other than for training).
- Submit a DD-214 that shows an Honorable or General Under Honorable conditions discharge.
- National Guard and Reserves Only—Served on Active Duty (other than for training.)

The Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services - Homeless Veterans Coordination (HVC) team collaborates closely with federal, state, local, and non-profit partners to ensure that homeless, at-risk, and incarcerated veterans receive the support and services they have rightfully earned. Our team engages in proactive outreach and accepts referrals from veterans, their families, friends, and community organizations. Once a veteran is identified, HVC staff work closely with them to assess their needs and determine the most appropriate course of action—whether that involves housing assistance, financial support, employment resources, case management, or other essential services. Throughout the process, our team remains actively engaged with both the veteran and service providers to ensure consistent, coordinated care.

### Avesta Housing—Thomas Heights

Opened in mid-December 2015, Thomas Heights was named in honor of Thomas Ptacek, a veteran and advocate for people experiencing homelessness. Thomas Ptacek, who became homeless for a time after serving in the U.S. Navy, has been a strong advocate for veterans and affordable housing in Portland for years.

Thomas Heights features 18 efficiency apartments targeted to veterans whose income is under 50% of the median area income. Located on a bus route at the base of Munjoy Hill, Thomas Heights' 18 households enjoy views of Back Cove, as well as easy access to services, shops, restaurants and Portland's Old Port.

In appreciation for the commitment and sacrifices made by Maine's current and former military, MaineHousing wishes to provide the most affordable way for veterans to either buy their first home or return to home ownership.

**To be eligible for the SaluteME or Salute Home Again program, applicants must:**

- Remain on active duty or have been honorably discharged from military service.
- Served on active duty for 180 days or within a war zone. (National Guard members who meet this qualification are eligible.)
- Be a first-time homebuyer or returning homebuyer whose new home will be their primary residence.
- Meet income limits.
- Meet home cost limits.

### VA Housing Programs

#### VA Home Loans

The VA helps service members, veterans, and eligible surviving spouses become homeowners. The VA will provide a home loan guaranty benefit and other housing-related programs to help you buy, build, repair, retain, or adapt a home for your own personal occupancy.

VA Home Loans are provided by private lenders, such as banks and mortgage companies. VA guarantees a portion of the loan, enabling the lender to provide you with more favorable terms.



- Purchase Loans help you purchase a home at a competitive interest rate often without requiring a down payment or private mortgage insurance.
- Cash Out Refinance loans allow you to take cash out of your home equity to take care of concerns like paying off debt, funding school, or making home improvements.
- Interest Rate Reduction Refinance Loan: also called the Streamline Refinance Loan can help you obtain a lower interest rate by refinancing your existing VA loan.
- Native American Direct Loan Program: helps eligible Native American veterans finance the purchase, construction, or improvement of homes on Federal Trust Land, or reduce the interest rate on a VA loan.
- Adapted Housing Grants: help veterans with a permanent and total service-connected disability purchase or build an adapted home or to modify an existing home to account for their disability.

## Housing Grants for Disabled Veterans

The VA provides grants to service members and veterans with certain permanent and total service-connected disabilities to help purchase or construct an adapted home, or modify an existing home to accommodate a disability.

Two grant programs exist: the Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) grant and the Special Housing Adaptation (SHA) grant.

### Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) Grant

SAH grants help veterans with certain service-connected disabilities live independently in a barrier-free environment. SAH grants can be used in one of the following ways:

- Construct a specially adapted home to be acquired.
- Build a home on land already owned if it is suitable for specially adapted housing.
- Remodel an existing home if it can be made suitable for specially adapted housing.
- Apply the grant against the unpaid principal mortgage balance of an adapted home already acquired without the assistance of a VA grant.

### Special Housing Adaptation (SHA) Grant

SHA grants help veterans with certain service-connected disabilities adapt or purchase a home to accommodate the disability. You can use SHA grants in one of the following ways:

- Adapt an existing home the veteran or a family member already owns in which the veteran lives.
- Adapt a home the veteran or family member intends to purchase in which the veteran will live.
- Help a veteran purchase a home already adapted in which the veteran will live.

## Veterans' Mortgage Life Insurance

Veterans' Mortgage Life Insurance (VMLI) is mortgage protection insurance that can help families of severely disabled service members or veterans pay off the home mortgage in the event of their death. VMLI provides up to \$200,000 mortgage life insurance and is payable only to the mortgage holder (i.e., a bank or mortgage lender), not to a beneficiary.

**VMLI is only available to service members and veterans with severe service-connected disabilities who:**

- Received a Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) grant to help build, remodel, or purchase a home, and
- Have the title to the home, and
- Have a mortgage on the home.

Veterans must apply for VMLI before their 70th birthday. Service members or veterans who receive a grant for the purchase of Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) will be advised by Loan Guaranty personnel if they are also eligible for VMLI to cover the unpaid mortgage on their home. The SAH agent will also assist with the VMLI application.

Maine offers several ways for veterans and service members to take advantage of the state's many parks, beaches and the Maine State Museum. The Maine Resident Free Lifetime Veteran Park and Museum Pass provides a day use pass to Maine's state parks and historic sites, as well as the Maine State Museum to veterans who are residents of Maine and received an honorable discharge or general discharge under honorable conditions. The Veteran State Park and Museum Pass does not expire and is valid for the lifetime of the holder.

The park pass is valid for the veteran only and is limited to Maine state parks and historic sites operated by the Maine Department of Conservation. Passes are non-transferable and may not be used by anyone other than the veteran.

Free State Park and Museum Access for Maine's Veterans and Active-Duty Personnel: Please note that Maine veterans age 65 years or older may also be issued a pass as it allows for museum access in addition to the free parks admission automatically entitled as a Maine senior citizen.

The Maine Resident Day Use Park Pass for Active Military Personnel entitles the holder, and the holder's spouse and unmarried children (when accompanied by the holder), to free admission at Maine's state parks and historic sites.

Eligible service members must have Maine as their home of residence and must be serving in an enlisted grade in the armed forces as defined in 10 United States Code, Section 101(a)(4). Passes are issued for a calendar year and may be renewed upon application and verification of continuing eligibility.

#### Neither pass may be used at the following locations:

- Acadia National Park
- Baxter State Park
- Allagash Wilderness Waterway
- Penobscot Corridor
- Penobscot Narrows Observatory
- Maine Wildlife Park

### Disabled Veterans Free Use of State Parks

**100% disabled veterans, their spouses, and unmarried children are exempt from paying:**

- Regular day use entrance fees to Maine's state parks.
- Shelter reservation fees.
- Family camping and reservation fees.
- Group camping and reservation fees (applicable to disabled veteran only.)

To take advantage of this benefit, the veteran must display either the special disabled veteran plate or similar placards and must be present in the car. Any group members that are not spouses or unmarried children are subject to regular use fees. State parks rules dictate that no more than 6 individuals may be on a family site and that the disabled veteran must be present for the entire reservation.

The veteran must make a request in writing to the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation & Forestry to be added to the Disabled Veterans' Camping List and submit a copy of their Maine Bureau of Motor Vehicle letter that states that they have a disabled veteran's plate for being 100% service-connected to the VA. Requests can be mailed to 22 State House Station, Augusta, ME 04330, emailed to [dacf@maine.gov](mailto:dacf@maine.gov), or faxed to 207-287-2400, and the veteran will be added to the list for free camping benefits.

### Disabled Veterans' Camping List

The veteran must make a request in writing to the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation & Forestry to be added to the Disabled Veterans' Camping List and submit a copy of their Maine Bureau of Motor Vehicle letter that states that they have a disabled veteran's plate for being 100% service-connected to the VA. Requests can be mailed to 22 State House Station, Augusta, ME 04330, emailed to [dacf@maine.gov](mailto:dacf@maine.gov), or faxed to 207-287-2400, and the veteran will be added to the list for free camping benefits.

A disabled veteran who has a service-connected disability evaluated at 50% or more may obtain a complimentary license to fish, trap, and hunt (including archery, muzzleload, crossbow). Maine's complimentary hunting and fishing license extends to: bear, migratory bird, pheasant, spring/fall wild turkey, coyote night hunt, one expanded archery antlerless deer permit, one expanded archery either sex permit, and—upon meeting the qualifications—a license to guide.

This license is available to disabled veterans who are residents of Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont.

This license remains valid for the life of the license holder, as long as the license holder continues to satisfy Inland Fisheries & Wildlife's residency requirements and the license is not revoked or suspended. Please visit the above website for more details and an application.

Since 2009, Maine has offered disabled veterans a free chance to participate in a controlled moose hunt in Aroostook County. Held in conjunction with the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (IF&W) and Smoldering Lake Outfitters, the Hunt provides permits to in-state residents and permits to out-of-state residents to hunt on broccoli fields to help with crop protection and herd management.

This Hunt is a very unique program and is unlike the regular IF&W moose lottery, as it requires each hunter to team up with a registered Maine Guide who has specific training for the Controlled Moose Hunt. Each year the Hunt is comprised of small groups of veterans and personal guides who hunt during August and September.

Typically, applications for the Hunt are posted on the Bureau of Veterans' Services' website at the beginning of May with the in-state participants drawn by lottery system in June. Maine residents interested in applying for the Hunt must have a Maine Disabled Veteran Complimentary Hunting License. Out of state residents must have a big game license from their home state and must be sponsored by a National Veterans' Service Organization.

Veterans who have previously tagged a moose through the Disabled Veterans' Controlled Moose Hunt are ineligible to hunt again.

This license is available to residents of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Rhode Island, Missouri, Texas, Delaware, Louisiana, and any other state that has reciprocal agreement with Maine.

A veteran who served during a recognized war period and is 62 years or older; or, is 100% disabled while serving, is eligible for up to \$6,000 off the just value of the property.

As of May 30, 2025, certain veterans qualify for an excise tax exemption for up to three vehicles in which their name appears on the vehicles' titles.

To qualify for this exemption, veterans must provide documentation proving their 100% disability rating from the Department of Veterans Affairs when registering their vehicles with the Maine Bureau of Motor Vehicles. Once verified, the excise tax exemption will be applied to the veteran's vehicle registration.

Applicants must provide their DD Form 214 to prove veteran status, as well as their VA ratings letter to confirm their service-connected disability.

As of January 1, 2016, military pension benefits, including survivor benefits, are completely exempt from Maine state income tax. Military retirees and their survivors who receive military pension benefits as a result of service in the active or reserve components of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines or Coast Guard are eligible for this benefit.

With this important reform, Maine joins 22 other states that honor their veterans by not taxing their pensions. Veterans with civilian employee retirement plan benefits may continue to utilize the \$10,000 pension exemption for qualifying plans.

Eligible veterans must complete the Worksheet for Pension Income Deduction available at [www.maine.gov/revenue/forms](http://www.maine.gov/revenue/forms), and submit the worksheet with your income tax return to claim a Pension Income Deduction.



## VA Compensation and Pension Programs

### Disability Compensation

Disability compensation is a monthly tax-free benefit paid to veterans who are at least 10% disabled because of injuries or diseases that were incurred in or aggravated during active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty training. A disability can apply to physical conditions, such as chronic knee issues, as well as mental health conditions, such as post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

The benefit amount is increased according to the degree of the veteran's disability on a scale from 10% to 100% (in increments of 10). Compensation may also be paid for disabilities that are considered related or secondary to disabilities occurring in service and for disabilities presumed to be related to circumstances of military service, even though they may arise after service.

Eligible veterans with dependents who are rated at 30% or greater may receive an additional allowance for dependents. Total disability compensation may be offset for veterans receiving military retirement pay, disability severance pay, or separation incentive payments.

Veterans wishing to apply for disability compensation must provide medical evidence of a current physical or mental disability and evidence of a connection between that disability and an injury, disease, or event in military service. Medical records or medical opinions are required to establish this relationship.

### Special Monthly Compensation

Special Monthly Compensations is an additional tax-free benefit that can be paid to veterans, their spouses, surviving spouses and parents. For veterans, SMC is a higher rate of compensation paid due to special circumstances such as the need of aid and attendance by another person or a specific disability, such as loss of use of one hand or leg.

#### Eligibility for SMC includes:

- You require the aid of another person in order to perform personal functions required in everyday living, such as bathing, feeding, dressing, adjusting prosthetic devices, or protecting yourself from the hazards of your daily environment.
- You are bedridden.
- You are a patient in a nursing home due to mental or physical incapacity.
- Your eyesight is limited to a corrected 5/200 visual acuity or less in both eyes; or concentric contraction of the visual field to 5 degrees or less.

### Supplemental Income for Wartime Veterans

VA helps veterans and their families cope with financial challenges by providing supplemental income through the Veterans Pension benefit. Veterans Pension is a tax-free monetary benefit payable to low-income wartime veterans.

To qualify for the pension, a veteran must have at least 90 days of active duty service, with at least one day during a wartime period. Veterans who entered active duty after September 7, 1980, generally must have served at least 24 months or the full period for which they were called or ordered to active duty (with some exceptions), with at least one day during a wartime period.

#### In addition to meeting minimum service requirements, the veteran must be:

- Age 65 or older, or
- Totally and permanently disabled, or
- A patient in a nursing home receiving skilled nursing care, or
- Receiving Social Security Disability Insurance, or
- Receiving Supplemental Security Income

## VA Life Insurance Programs

The VA offers a variety of life insurance programs to provide the families of veterans and service members with financial security and peace of mind.

### Service-members' Group Life Insurance

Service-members' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) is a program that provides low-cost term life insurance coverage to eligible service members. Service members who qualify for SGLI are automatically enrolled and issued the maximum coverage. SGLI provides automatic life insurance coverage of \$400,000 to service members upon enlistment. Members with SGLI also get automatic coverage for their dependent children and spouses.

#### Service-members automatically enrolled in SGLI include:

- Active duty members of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, or Coast Guard.
- Commissioned members of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) or the U.S. Public Health Service (USPHS).
- Cadets or midshipmen of the U.S. military academies.
- Members, cadets, or midshipmen of the Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) engaged in authorized training and practice cruises.
- Members of the Ready Reserve or National Guard who are scheduled to perform at least 12 periods of inactive training per year.
- Service members who volunteer for a mobilization category in the Individual Ready Reserve.

### Family Service-Members' Group Life Insurance

Family Service-members' Group Life Insurance (FSGLI) is a program that provides term life insurance coverage to the spouses and dependent children of service-members insured under SGLI. The service member pays the premium for spousal coverage.

Dependent children are insured at no cost.

#### Spouses & dependent children of the following are eligible if:

- Active duty service members covered by full-time SGLI and
- Members of the National Guard or Ready Reserve of a uniformed service covered by full-time SGLI.

Family coverage is available only to members insured under the SGLI program. If you are covered under full-time SGLI, you are eligible to insure your spouse, regardless of whether your spouse is on active duty, retired, or is a civilian. FSGLI provides up to a maximum of \$100,000 of insurance coverage for spouses, not to exceed the service members' SGLI coverage amount, & \$10,000 for dependent children.

### Service-members' Group Life Insurance Traumatic Injury Protection

Service-members' Group Life Insurance Traumatic Injury Protection (TSGLI) provides automatic traumatic injury coverage to all service members covered under the SGLI program. TSGLI offers short-term financial assistance to severely injured service members and veterans to assist them in their recovery from traumatic injuries. TSGLI is not only for combat injuries, but provides insurance coverage for injuries incurred on or off duty.

Service members insured under full-time SGLI are automatically covered by TSGLI. TSGLI coverage applies to active duty members, Reservists, National Guard members, funeral honors duty and one day muster duty.

#### To be eligible for payment of TSGLI, service members must meet all of the following requirements:

- Insured by SGLI when you experience a traumatic injury.
- Incurred a scheduled loss that was a direct result of a traumatic injury.
- Suffered the traumatic injury prior to midnight of the day that you separate from the uniformed services.
- Suffered a scheduled loss within 730 days of the traumatic injury.
- Survived for a period of not less than seven full days from the date of the traumatic injury.

This benefit is also provided retroactively for service members who incurred severe losses as a result of traumatic injuries between October 7, 2001 and November 30, 2005, regardless of the geographic location where the injury occurred, and regardless of whether coverage was in effect at the time of injury. As of October 2017, nearly all service members may manage their SGLI coverage using the SGLI Online Enrollment System (SOES). Through the SOES, service members may decline SGLI coverage, select a lesser amount than maximum coverage, designate beneficiaries, and/or make other changes.

## Veterans' Emergency Financial Assistance Program (VEFAP)

The Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services has created the Veterans' Emergency Financial Assistance Program (VEFAP) for veterans who suffer an emergency and do not have sufficient savings or access to other financial assistance to resolve it. Examples of grant assistance (up to \$2,000) for veterans who are Maine residents include:

- To prevent or resolve the veteran from being homeless
- Vehicle repair to maintain employment
- Illness of the veteran or family member that results in hardship
- Damage to the veteran's home due to fire, flood, or hurricane that is not covered by insurance
- Dental emergency (suffering pain and/or infection)
- Any other condition that puts the veteran at risk of not having the basic necessities of food, shelter, or safety.

To qualify for Veteran Emergency Financial Assistance Program (VEFAP) funds, a discharge status of "Honorable" or "General Under Honorable Conditions" is required. For those who do not meet this requirement, philanthropic funding may be available as an alternative.

Our mission is to assist veterans and their dependents who are in need, to advocate for those in active crisis/emergency, to prevent homelessness, and to help those who are homeless to transition into stable housing.

Existing government funded programs have specific contractual requirements that do not always meet the needs of the veteran. Most of these contracts do not require 24/7 availability. And many require a process that takes time and has administrative processes that delay the ability to provide the needed services. Maine Veterans in Need (MVN), taking no government funds, does not have the administrative requirements of other organizations and provides the services after an initial review of the need and usually meets the need quickly and efficiently. As many of the MVN members are organizations that have government funding, MVN can connect the veteran with the appropriate agency that can meet long-term need.

### Our services include:

- Food Cards
- Gas Cards
- Short-Term Hotel Room Stays During Times that Other Agencies Aren't Available
- Phone Cards and Trac Phones
- Assistance in Enrollment with VA Healthcare
- Making Payments on: Phone bills to prevent phone disconnect,
- Car payments to prevent repossession, and home heating fuel.

## Veterans' Group Life Insurance

Veterans' Group Life Insurance (VGLI) is a program that continues life insurance coverage after separation from service. VGLI will provide lifetime coverage as long as premiums are paid. Veterans may enroll for a maximum amount of coverage that is equal to the amount of SGLI coverage they had when separating from service. Lesser amounts of coverage are also available in increments of \$10,000.

Once enrolled in VGLI, coverage may be increased by \$25,000 every five years up to the legislated maximum of \$400,000, until age 60.

### Veterans are eligible to apply for VGLI if they had SGLI and are within one year and 120 days of the following events:

- Release from active duty or active duty for training under a call or order to duty that does not specify a period of less than 31 days.
- Separation, retirement or release from assignment from the Ready Reserves/National Guard.
- Assignment to the Individual Ready Reserves (IRR) of a branch of service or to the Inactive National Guard (ING). This includes members of the United States Public Health Service Inactive Reserve Corps (IRC).
- Placement on the Temporary Disability Retirement List (TDRL)

Veterans are also eligible to apply for VGLI if they had part-time SGLI and while performing duty, suffered an injury or disability that rendered them uninsurable at standard premium rates.

## Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance

The Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (S-DVI) program was established in 1951 to meet the insurance needs of certain veterans with service-connected disabilities. S-DVI is available in a variety of permanent plans as well as term insurance. Policies are issued for a maximum face amount of \$10,000.

### Veterans can apply for S-DVI if they meet the following four criteria:

- Released from active duty under other than dishonorable conditions on or after April 25, 1951.
- Rated for a service-connected disability (even if only 0%).
- Are in good health except for any service-connected conditions.
- Apply within two years from the date VA grants your new service-connected disability.

Copies of military discharges (DD Form 214 form or equivalent) are often required as proof of service when applying for state and federal veteran benefits, as well as programs from local municipalities and discounts from retailers.

### Discharge documents may be requested by an individual to prove veteran status for benefits or by:

- Case managers or social workers helping a veteran access benefits.
- Funeral homes coordinating burials for veterans.
- Family members who wish to join a veteran service organization or to learn more about their family member's military career.



The Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services has an archive of nearly 50,000 discharge records, which are available for free to veterans and eligible family members. If you are a veteran who entered the military from Maine, the Bureau of Veterans' Services may have a copy of your DD Form 214 (or equivalent) on file. Maine offers a military service designation on driver's licenses that allows veterans and service members to prove military status for discounts at businesses and retail outlets.

#### To obtain this designation, applicants must:

- Be currently serving in the United States Armed Forces and show military ID.
- Provide a DD Form 214 verifying that they had an honorable discharge from the United States military.
- Provide a VA ID or service-connected disability ratings letter to verify honorable veteran status.

If you currently have the field of stars background on your license, you do not need to show additional information or reapply for the military service designation. If you wish to have the flag indicator added to the license other than at renewal time, there is a \$5.00 duplicate fee.

Applicants will also have to bring documentation verifying Maine residency and legal presence in the United States if they have not already done so. A complete list of acceptable documents can be found at [www.maine.gov/sos/bmv](http://www.maine.gov/sos/bmv). Any branch of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles can distribute a license with the military service designation.

## Veteran Identification Card

In November 2017, the VA rolled out a national Veterans Identification Card (VIC) to allow all veterans with honorable service an opportunity to prove veteran status. As of 2022, the VIC is a digital only program.

Only those veterans with an honorable discharge or general (under honorable conditions) can request a VIC.

The VIC can be used to prove veteran status for those who served the minimum obligated time in service, but did not meet the retirement or medical discharge threshold.

In addition, veterans who served in the reserve components are eligible to apply for the ID card. The VIC will provide proof of military service, and may be accepted by retailers in lieu of the DD Form 214 to obtain promotional discounts and other services offered to veterans. The VIC does not qualify veterans for any health benefits or other state and federal veteran programs.

To request a VIC, veterans must visit [www.va.gov](http://www.va.gov) and sign in or create an account. This is the only way to obtain a VIC, the cards are not available at any VA hospitals or clinics.

- Unremarried surviving spouses and dependents of service members who pass away on active duty.
- Family members of veterans whose service-connected disability was rated 100 percent permanent and total at the time of death.

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles offers qualified veterans specialized decals for their Special Veteran and Disability Special Veteran plates.

Veterans interested in placing decals on their Special Veterans or Disability Special Veterans Plates may review the information on this website to learn how to obtain the decals. These decals are a small way to recognize veterans for their service to our country.

#### How the Veterans Decal program works

Documentation Required: A veteran who already has veterans' plates may obtain decals by bringing a copy of their DD-214 (report of separation or discharge from active duty) to verify eligibility to a Bureau of Motor Vehicles branch office. The DD-214 and the appropriate fee may also be mailed to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Attention: Registration Unit, 29 State House Station, Augusta, ME 04333-0029.

For a veteran who did not receive a medal until after discharge, and who seeks a decal representing this medal, a copy of the military orders or a copy of the citation will serve as proof of eligibility.



An honorably discharged veteran may obtain up to three sets of veterans' plates and decals. There is no additional fee for a special veteran or disability special veteran plate and the fee for a set of decals is \$5.00 per set. There is no fee for replacement decals.

#### Placement of Decals

Decals are to be placed on the left side of the plate

Different decals may be requested for separate sets of plates; however, decals may not be mixed. Example, if you have two sets of Special Veteran Plates and have been awarded both the Vietnam Service Medal and the Bronze Star, you may display the Bronze Star decals on one set of plates and the Vietnam Service Medal decals on the other set of plates.

In 2011, Public Law Chapter 246 was enacted by the First Regular Session of the 125th Legislature which established the Gold Star Family License Plate. To be eligible for the plate, a family member must have received a Gold Star Lapel Button (purple background) from the casualty branch of service, or be eligible to receive a Gold Star Lapel Button from the federal government. The Gold Star Lapel Button signifies that the service member was killed-in-action or died in a combat theater of operations.

In 2015, the 127th Legislature enacted Public Law Chapter 17, which amended the laws governing the Gold Star Family Plate. Specifically, this law allows issuance of gold star family registration plates for family members, including grandparents, of a person who died while on active duty, but not in combat. This plate features the Gold Star (GS) on a gold background, versus the purple background for those killed in combat. The 2015 law also authorizes the issuance of gold star family vanity registration plates that feature the "GS" classification and can be customized with up to five characters.

Family members may also request a Gold Star Family License Wall Plate to be used for ceremonial, display purposes.

#### Eligible family members for a Gold Star Family License Plate (must be Maine residents) include:

- Widow or Widower.
- Parents (includes stepparents, parents through adoption, and foster parents).
- Children (includes stepchildren and children through adoption).

- Brothers/sisters (includes half-brothers/sisters).
- Grandparents of those who died after March 28, 1973

Families of service members who meet above eligibility requirements must submit a completed license application, as well as a DD Form 1300 Casualty Report, (or other official paperwork indicating death on active duty in support of a combat or non-combat operation), and proof of relationship which may be copies of birth, marriage, or baptismal certificates.

Applications and more details regarding eligibility requirements may be found at the above link. Once eligibility has been verified, the Bureau of Veterans' Services will coordinate with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for the issuance of license plate(s). Only one license plate or set of plates will be issued per qualifying family member. The Gold Star Family License Plate may only be used on a car or pickup truck rated 6,000 lbs. or fewer.

In 2019, the 129th Legislature enacted PL 443 which allows holders of Gold Star Family vehicle registration plates to be issued complimentary licenses to hunt, trap and fish.

In addition to recreational opportunities, Gold Star Families will now be exempt from vehicle registration fees.

### Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC)

Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs) are behavioral health organizations that provide a broad range of community behavioral health services. CCBHCs focus on coordinated care and use of evidence-based practices for individuals across their lifespan, regardless of their ability to pay.

The Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is leading the development of a CCBHC service, reimbursement model, and certification process for qualifying behavioral health organizations in Maine. Maine DHHS is prioritizing stakeholder engagement to promote active collaboration in the development of the CCBHC model.

#### What services do CCBHCs provide?

CCBHCs are required to provide access to core services outlined in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration's (SAMHSA) CCBHC criteria:

- **Comprehensive care planning** is a process of identifying treatment goals and preferences of the person receiving services.
- **Peer and family support services** offer a peer, a person with lived experience with behavioral healthcare, to help people and families in need of support to access helpful resources.



- **Case management assists people receiving services** in gaining access to needed medical, social, legal, education, housing, vocational, and other services and supports.
- **Outpatient mental health and substance use treatment services** offer behavioral health care like therapy and medications.
- **Psychiatric rehabilitation services** help people develop skills to support community living, like attaining housing, education, or employment.
- **Physical health monitoring** includes screening and reviewing health symptoms that may need support from a Primary Care Provider.
- **Care coordination and outreach** are activities provided by the CCBHC to help a person engage in needed services and to make sure all care team members are working together in support of the person receiving services.

#### Who is eligible?

- CCBHC services are available to everyone, including but not limited to people with serious mental illness, serious emotional disturbances, mild or moderate mental illness, and substance use disorders. All people may walk into CCBHC clinics and be screened for service eligibility.
- CCBHC clinics must serve all individuals regardless of where they live or whether they are able to pay. CCBHCs offer options to pay for services based on a person's income for people who are uninsured or underinsured.

The Veterans' Justice Outreach (VJO) Initiative was created by the Veterans Administration (VA) to link eligible veterans involved with the local justice systems to their local veterans medical center for health care services which target the symptoms implicated in their criminal justice case.

Please contact the VJO Coordinator if you or a family member are a veteran in jail, or have gotten out of jail and want to be connected to VA Maine Healthcare system.

Or, if you or a family member/friend are a veteran already receive VA Maine Healthcare, but need help with access to specialty care (homeless services, residential treatment,) to fulfill your agreement with the criminal justice system.

The VA provides a variety of services to meet the needs of aging veterans with the goal of keeping them at home and in their communities. Residential or inpatient care may also be available to veterans, especially to those with service-connected needs. Eligible veterans must be enrolled and receiving primary care at the VA.

**Services include:**

- Skilled Home Health Nursing - (x3534).
- Provides skilled home health care for veterans returning home from inpatient care at a VA hospital.
- Homemaker Home Health Aid Program (H/HHA) NonInstitutional Respite—same contacts as above.
- Offers in-home care for veterans who would otherwise need to reside in a nursing home, also provides respite for veterans' live-in, full-time caregivers.
- Home Based Primary Care (HBPC)—HBPC (x4665).
- Outpatient program that coordinates in-home care for veterans including nursing, case management, nutrition, and OT/PT. Other specialized care and services may be available, depending on the needs of the veteran.
- Community Adult Day Health Care (CADHC)—(x5479).
- Provides veterans with socialization and care at a licensed CADHC facility, while also providing respite for live-in caregivers. Some programs are specific to veterans with dementia.
- Geriatric Outpatient Clinic—(x5450).
- Clinic operates 5 days per week, providing initial evaluations, care management, and specialized services, based on need.
- Medical Foster Home (MFH) Program—(x4665).
- Provides nursing home care to veterans in their private homes. MFH partners with HBPC to coordinate the delivery of medical care in the veteran or caregiver's home. Veterans in the MFH program must meet VA nursing home criteria.



- Community Residential Care (CRC) Program—(x5380).
- Outpatient program for veterans who do not need hospital or nursing home care, but cannot live alone because of medical or psychiatric conditions. CRC is available to veterans who do not have a caregiver or other support person to provide monitoring, supervision, or help with activities of daily living. Care is provided in assisted living facilities, personal care homes, group homes, and psychiatric community residential care homes.
- Community Living Centers (CLCs)—CLCs & Short-Term Rehab: (x5511); Inpatient Hospice and Palliative Care (x5663).
- VA Maine has four CLCs, offering a variety inpatient nursing home services on the Togus campus: Patriot Place—27 beds dedicated to specialized dementia care; Veterans Village—37 beds for skilled rehab and nursing care; Togus Springs—12 beds for inpatient hospice and palliative care; Independence Way—12 bed skilled nursing and rehab unit providing short-term care, including physical, occupational, and speech therapies.
- Contract Nursing Home Program—(x5380).
- Coordinates placements for veterans in VA-approved rehabilitation and/or long-term nursing home care at VA expense. Eligibility depends on the percentage of the veteran's service-connected disability and other factors. There are currently 19 VA-contracted nursing homes dispersed throughout Maine.
- State Veterans Homes are facilities that provide nursing home, domiciliary, or adult day care. For eligible veterans, the VA will help defray costs associated with care at the Homes. Although the Home accept non-veteran spouses and gold star parents, the VA will only cover expenses for veterans. Eligible veterans are honorably discharged veterans who have served one or more days of active duty service outside of training purposes.

- Provides support and assistance with referrals to caregivers of veterans. Referrals could include VA services such as Adult Day Health Care, Homemaker and Home Health Aid, Home Telehealth, Respite Care, as well connections to non-VA community resources.

VA Maine Healthcare System (HCS) is a Joint Commission accredited facility which serves over 42,000 Maine veterans. It is comprised of the Togus VA Medical Center In Augusta along with eight full-time Community-Based Outpatient Clinics (CBOC) and three part-time Access Points. All 12 facilities provide Primary Care and Mental Health at a minimum and VA Maine HCS has a wide-range of Specialty Care and services. Although the majority of Specialty Care is located at the Togus VAMC, we are expanding some Specialty Care to the CBOCs and are significantly increasing the use of tele-health for Specialty Care to reduce travel for the Veterans.

The Togus campus also hosts the Togus VA Regional Office which provides various Veteran services including Compensation/ Disabilities, Vocational Rehabilitation, education, insurance, home loans, etc.

The Togus VAMC campus is the site of a Volunteers of America project that provides 21 Cabins in the Woods for homeless Veterans. Additionally, a new 16 unit Fisher House for families of Togus inpatient veterans was built across from the Togus Hospital in 2018.

VA Community Care (formerly NVCC) is an outpatient program that provides authorization for eligible veterans to obtain routine, recurring outpatient medical treatment services through non-VA healthcare providers. This short term authorization may be granted when it has been determined by the appropriate clinic that direct VA treatment services are not available or are geographically inaccessible to meet the Veterans' needs.

Community Care (NVCC) inpatient program provides payment authorization for eligible veterans who have been admitted to an outside hospital. Hospitals throughout Maine will call the VA when a veteran is admitted seeking VA payment authorization. In-patient transfers/admissions, processes internal hospital transfers, and discharges to/from the hospital or nursing home facility or overnight lodging. Depending on the circumstances and the eligibility of the veteran, the VA reserves the position to have the veteran transferred to VA facility for further treatment.

The VFW's voice had been instrumental in establishing the Veterans Administration, creating a GI Bill® for the 20th century, developing the national veteran's cemetery system and advocating for compensation for Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange and for veterans diagnosed with Gulf War Syndrome. In 2008, VFW won a long-fought victory with the passing of a GI Bill® for the 21st Century, giving expanded educational benefits to America's active-duty service members, and members of the Guard and Reserves, fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The VFW also has fought for improving VA medical center facilities and services for women veterans. Besides helping fund the creation of the Vietnam, Korean War, World War II and Women in Military Service memorials, the VFW in 2005 became the first veterans' organization to contribute to building the new Disabled Veterans for Life Memorial, which was being constructed in Washington, D.C. The fundraising goal was reached in mid-2010, and ground for the memorial broken on November 10, 2010. The memorial was dedicated by then President Barack Obama on October 5, 2014.

From providing \$2.5 million in college scholarships to high school students every year, to encouraging elevation of the Veterans Administration, to the president's cabinet, the VFW is there for our veterans.

Vet2Vet Maine, a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, recruits veterans to serve as friendly visitors to aging and disabled veterans in their area. Each volunteer passes a background check, provides three references, and receives online training. Once processed, each volunteer is matched to a veteran with similar interests, life stories, and experiences—all help seal the bond between the two veterans. The volunteer visits in the veteran's home at least twice a month, providing companionship and friendship and helping the veteran access VA and other available benefits and services. Volunteers attend a monthly case review in which they discuss their experiences with their veterans, share tips, make referrals, and resolve problems, as well as bond with the other volunteers. Vet2Vet Maine also offers a caregiver support group to family members of enrolled veterans.

Wreaths Across America is a national nonprofit organization founded in 2007 to continue and expand the annual wreathlaying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery begun by Maine businessman Morrill Worcester in 1992. Wreaths Across America's mission—Remember, Honor, Teach—is carried out in part by coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies at Arlington, as well as at veterans' cemeteries and other locations in all 50 states and beyond. Since its founding, the organization has expanded to include more than 1,500 local fundraising groups in all 50 states, representing nearly 1,300 participating locations, along with our nation's cemetery at Arlington. Every year since 2008, Congress proclaims a Saturday in December as National Wreaths Across America Day.

In 2011, Wreaths Across America opened a 2,000 square-foot museum at its Maine headquarters to showcase the hundreds (now thousands) of items donated to the organization over the years. These include personal photos, awards, uniforms, helmets and other military memorabilia. All donations help to provide insight and tell the greater story of the experiences of U.S. military personnel. Overall, the Museum serves to document Wreaths Across America's history and dedication to remembering those who gave their lives while serving their country, honoring those who serve and teaching the value of freedom to the next generation. It is free and open to the public year round.





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
